Moral Rearmament Was Her Subject

Miss Elsie Heaps Speaker at Meeting of Japanese Young People's Association

At the monthly devotional and fellowship tea of the Nippon Young People's Association on Sunday afternoon at the St. Andrew's Anglican Japanese Mission, Miss Elsie Heaps gave an interesting talk on "Moral Rearmament." She told of the second world assembly which she attended at Los Angeles where 1500 delegates from thirty different nations gathered. Of 400 delegates from Canada 150 were from British Columbia. The opening meeting was held at Hollywood Bowl which was filled with 30,000 persons, ten thousand having to be turned away. Miss Heaps told of the stirring messages of various speakers among whom was Miss Hsue Hirano formerly of Prince Rupert, who spoke for the second Japanese generation in Canada. Miss Heaps explained briefly the meaning of moral rearmament.

Twenty-one members were present at the meeting and the president, Setsuo Kuwahara, was in the chair.
