THEIR TOUR DOWN COAST SUCCESSFUL

MEMBERSHIP AND SCOPE OF NATIVE BROTHERHOOD INCREASED WITH ADDITION OF NEW TRIBES AND VILLAGES

As a result of an organization tour during the past month to the centres of native population along the lower mainland and Vancouver Island by Alfred Adams of Masset, the president, the membership and spheres of influence of the Native Brotherhood of British Columbia has been greatly increased. Mr. Adams, who made the trip aboard the Masset, packed Edenshaw, is spending a few days in the city before continuing his homeward trip to the Queen Charlotte Islands. Mr. Adams found the villages down the coast much interested in the Brotherhood and its objectives of improving the conditions of the natives. At a number of points organization of local branches was perfected while other places gave assurance that they would be coming in. Mr. Adams and his companions were well received everywhere and special hospitality was accorded them.

Departure was made from Massett on March 3 by Mr. Adams, his son, Ivan, accompanying him. Prince Rupert was reached the same day and on March 4 departure was made for Hartley Bay where Heber L. Clifton was picked up for the trip. Then at Bella Bella Caleb Williams, Frank Wilbur and William Gladstone joined the party. After the Native Sisterhood of British Columbia had given a banquet, departure was made from Bella Bella on March 8 for Alert Bay.

At Alert Bay representatives of nine villages awaited the Brotherhood organizers and a very interesting conference was held there during the next three days, the nine villages all joining up in one day. The Brotherhood executive inspector, St. Michael's residential school, being welcomed by the principal, Rev. F. A. Anfield, the matron and Mr. Venables, the resident missionary. Banquets were given and there were conferences with Chiefs Stephen Cook, Joe Harris, Moses Alfred, Peter Knox, Dan Crammer and Olly Shannysie. Hitler and His Press Still Rail As Britain Tries Counter Move

MOVE BY GREAT BRITAIN AND FRANCE TO RETURN THEIR AMBASSADORS TO BERLIN TAKEN AS SIGN OF RECONCILIATION

LONDON, April 3.—While Chancellor Adolf Hitler and his Nazi-controlled press in Germany continue to rail, Great Britain proceeds with its active organization of the "Stop Hitler" bloc which it hopes may extend in an unbroken line across Europe to the Dardanelles. As it has done for Poland, Great Britain, with the co-operation of

France, is believed about to offer armed support to Roumania in the event of aggression and steps are being taken to revise a mutual assistance agreement between Roumania and Poland. Endeavours continue to bring Yugoslavia, Greece and Turkey into the general agreement with which Russia will, it is expected, at least co-operate.

The Anglo-French guarantee to Poland will be followed by similar commitments to other countries which stand in the way of an attempt by Germany to dominate Europe. Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain announced in the House of Commons today. Although Chamberlain did not specify the countries he had in mind, it was generally expected that Roumania would be the first to be given a guarantee similar to Poland's.

Great Britain's new policy of solidifying the nations opposed to German expansionist aims could not be carried out if the guarantee was confined to Poland. Mr. Chamberlain said.

In the event that Germany had no aggressive intentions against her neighbors, any agreement to resist her would become inoperative, the Premier said.

It was fantastic, Mr. Chamberlain said, for Hitler to talk on Saturday about encirclement of Germany.

Co-operation of Russia, regardless of her internal system of government, would be welcomed, said Mr. Chamberlain:

There was sign of reconciliation among Europe's estranged big powers today with reports that early British and French consultations were planned in regard to returning to Berlin recalled ambassadors.

Meanwhile, Great Britain is continuing its efforts to bring about a settlement between Italy and France over the territorial dispute in which case Premier Mussolini might serve as a mediator between Germany and Poland.

Col. Joseph Beck, Polish foreign minister, arrived in London today to discuss the situation with the British government. In addition to the question of defence, colonies will also be discussed.

Early Resident Of City Is Dead In Peace River

Pennsylvania Coal Mine Walk-Out Is Believed Imminent
