Prince Rupert is asking is that the necessary assurance be given the bank in order that the hydro electric scheme may be proceeded with.

The City Solicitor.

On the same subject the City Solicitor explained that the Attorney General's objection is based simply upon the form of the bill to ratify the bylaw.

"We have the written assurance that the bylaw will be ratified signed by the president of council," said Mr. Peters. "There is absolutely no cause for uncertainty about it. The bylaw will be ratified. The bank has already advanced money on the written assurance of the Government to that effect."

The explanation of the difficulty as gathered from reliable sources by The Daily News besides those quoted is simply this: The Attorney General's criticism is aimed at the form of the bill which seeks to ratify the whole of the hydro electric bylaw, not simply the point at issue that the schemes are presented as one enterprise.

BRILLIANT MASQUERADE BALL ACHIEVED NOTEWORTHY SUCCESS—FLOOR TRANSFORMED INTO A WONDERLAND OF CLEVER FANCY COSTUMES—DETAILS OF MOST STRIKING.

Quite the most fancifully and elaborately dressed invitation masquerade dance ever yet held in Prince Rupert took place last night in the McIntyre Hall. The dance might go down to history in Rupert as the "Alice in Wonderland Dance," for characters from the world famous story book were much in evidence amongst an array of strikingly pretty and clever costumes. Some fifty or more couples were present, and during the full swing of the dance the hall presented a vividly animated appearance. Music by Gray's orchestra ensured the pleasure of the dancers, and during intervals refreshments were liberally served. The program included a number of extras, with special "leap year" dances. Masks were removable after the grand march, following the fourth dance, and many were the surprises in evidence then. Excellent good humor pervaded the assembly. The dance was a decided success.

MILK INSPECTION

Eylaw Regulating the Vending of Milk Passed by Council.

At last night's session of the City Council the Milk-Inspection bylaw was passed. It carries a license fee and regulations for the stabling of cows, their water supply and food. There can be no adulteration of milk by adding water or otherwise and skimmed milk has to carry a large label. The penalties attached to non-compliance with the regulations are not exceeding \$20 for the first offense and not exceeding \$100 for succeeding offenses.
