GERMAN SHOT DOWN THE HAGUE-A German military plane was shot down by Dutch anti-aircraft fire today, the pilot being killed. The plane was flying over Dutch territory near the frontier. Official Dutch circles deny receiving a warning from Germany against shooting down Nazi planes over Dutch territory.
