## Whifflets

From The Waterfront

Several of the Skeena River canneries have been cleaning up since the closing of the season for sock-eye fishing ten days ago and will be closing down this week for the winter. At the end of this week James Lamb, manager of Cassiar Cannery, and Mrs. Lamb; C. E. Salter, manager of Carlisle Cannery, and Mrs. Salter and Mrs. E. E. Avis, wife of the assistant manager of Carlisle and family will be among those leaving the Skeena River on the Cardena for Vancouver to spend the winter.

C. P. R. steamer Princess Louise, Capt. S. K. Gray, which was in port Saturday afternoon from 3:30 to 5:45 southbound from Skagway to Vancouver, had a total of 233 passengers on board. Seven disembarked from the vessel here while three took passage from this port for the south aboard her.

The coastal freighter Salvor, Capt. Albert Georgeson, after having been in port since 6:30 Friday evening discharging local cargo, sailed at 4 o'clock Saturday afternoon on her return to Vancouver via Skeena River canneries where she was to load canned salmon.

Union steamer Catala, Capt. James Findlay, arrived in port at 1:30 this morning from Vancouver and waypoints and sailed a couple of hours later for Stewart. Anyox and other northern points whence she will return here tomorrow afternoon southbound.

C. P. R. steamer Princess Charlotte, Capt. William Palmer, making her final voyage of the season in the Alaska tourist service, arrived in port at 9 o'clock this morning from Vancouver and sailed at noon for Skagway and other northern points whence she will return here Saturday afternoon southbound. The vessel had a fair-sized list of round trip tourists although that traffic is now beginning to fall off definitely. In all she had 156 passengers including 18 for Prince Rupert. Half a dozen embarked here for the north. The through list including a number of Alaskan school teachers returning north to resume their duties for the fall.

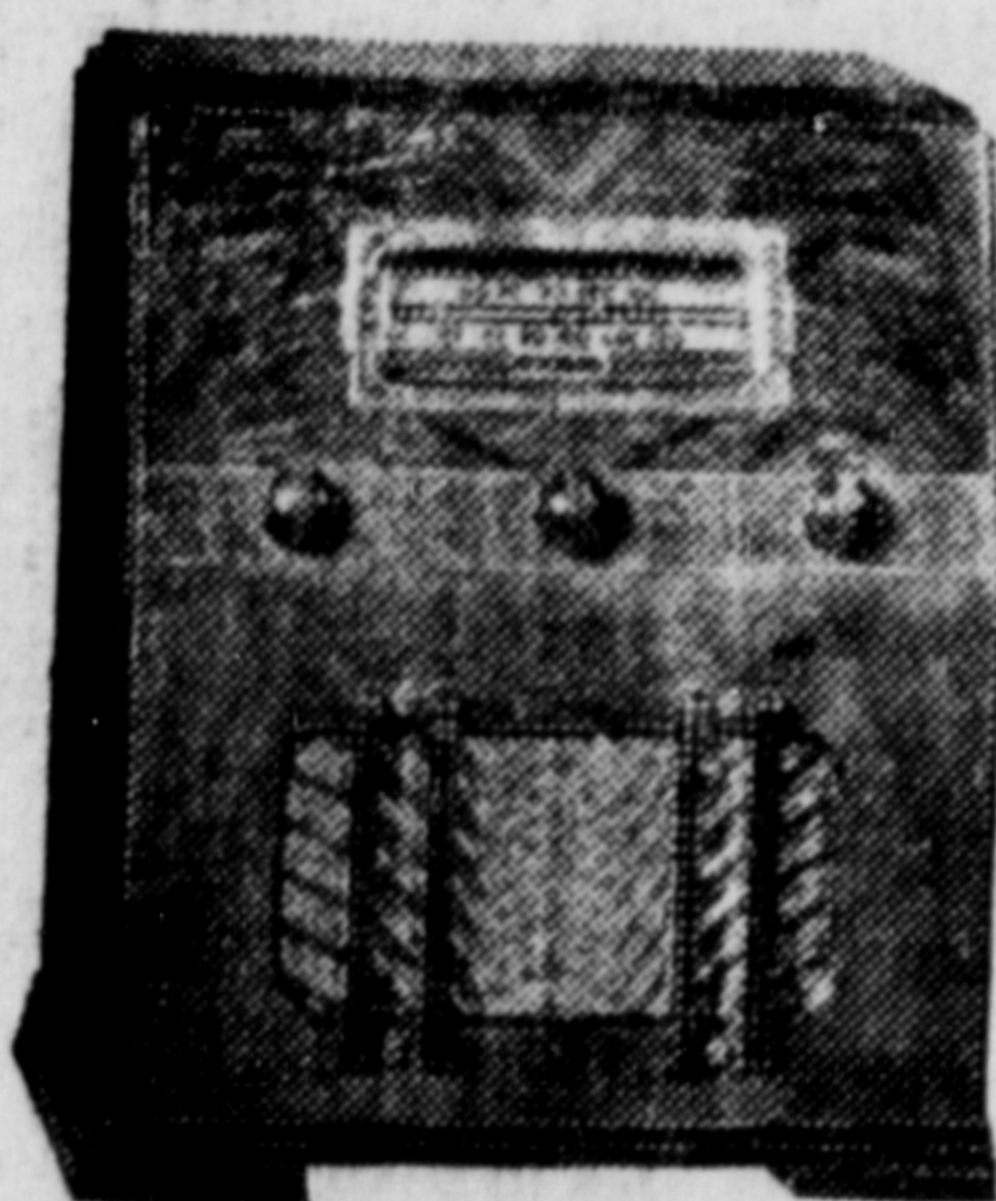
