New Tuberculosis Preventorium for Natives Scene of Ceremony Today

among the natives, a tuberculosis for the season places Blake on top preventorium is being opened to- with 35 points. day at St. Michael's School Alert Bay. This building is unique in that it has been constructed by the Indian boys themselves as a manual training project. Twelve lads, aged from 14 to 16 years, under the expert instruction of a paid foreman, started the work last October and, in spite of adverse weather conditions, are seeing their task brought to completion today with the building being officially opened by Rev. Dr. T. B. R. Westgate, executive secretary of the Indian School Commission of the Anglican Church in Canada, and Dr. A. L. McQuarrie, medical director for British Columbia of the

Indian Department. Built from plans prepared in the manual training department of the school, the building is 56 feet long by 30 feet deep with basement and has been built in conformity with provincial building regulations. All electrical work is in conduit and the unit is heated with a large hot air furnace.
