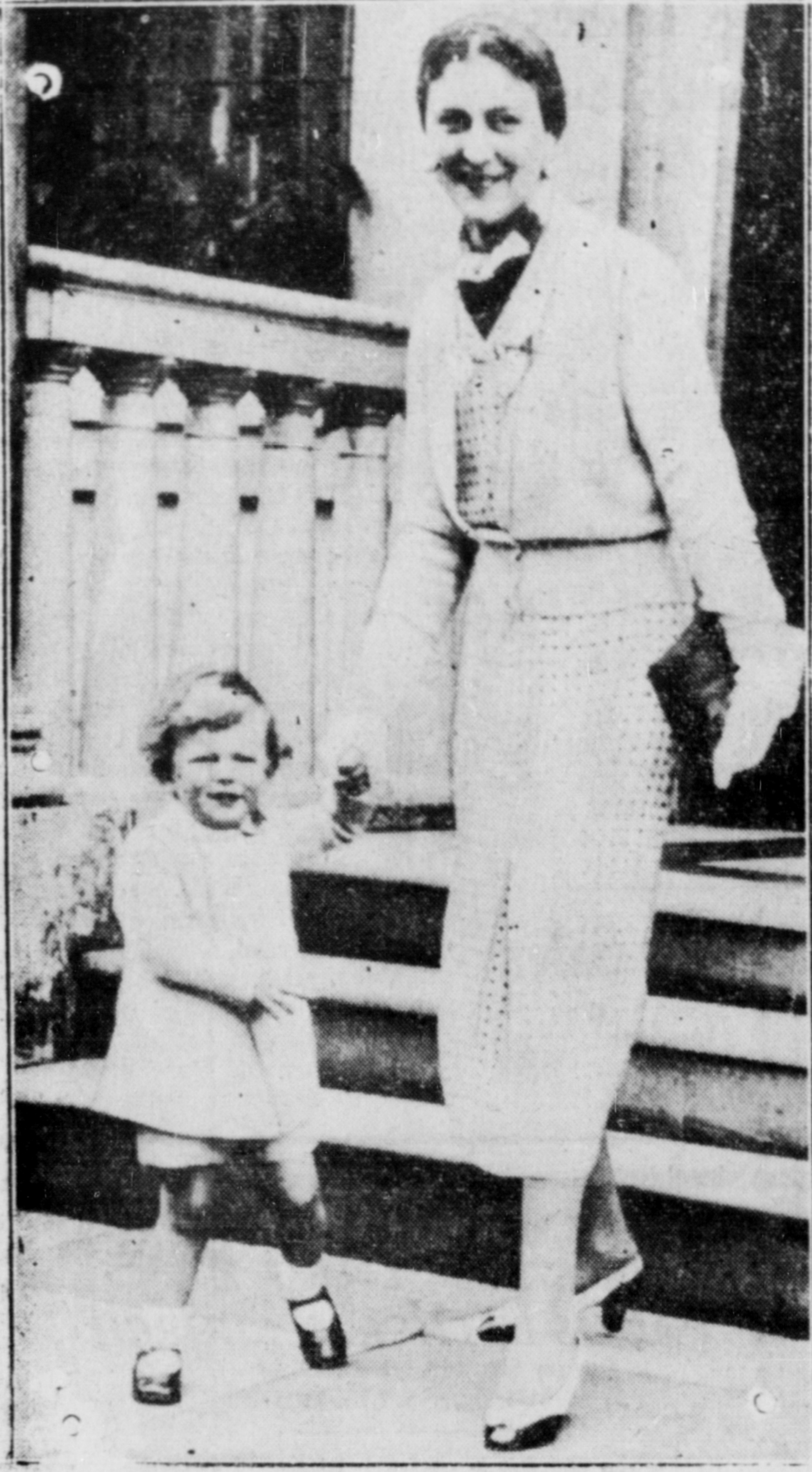


ROYAL SMILE FOR PHOTOGRAPHER

HOSPITAL MEETING

Various Routine Matters Dealt With as Well as Rate Increase and Matron Appointment

The board of directors of the Prince Rupert General Hospital was in regular monthly session last night. Business, to large extent, was of routine nature although such new business as the appointment of a lady superintendent to succeed Miss Jean Harrison R.N., lady superintendent, and the setting of increased hospital rates came up. President G. P. Tinker was in the chair and others present were F. A. MacCallum, R. E. Benson, G. V. Wilkinson, Frank Dibb, Dr. R. G. Large and Mrs. H. L. Landry, directors; H. W. Birch, managing secretary, and Miss Jean Harrison R.N., lady superintendent.

The only correspondence coming before the board was the monthly report of the fire chief stating that fire alarm systems were in good order and housekeeping conditions satisfactory. Installation of a new laundry room had been very satisfactory.

Miss Harrison, the lady superintendent, reported that the institution was now getting settled down nicely in the new building. Furnishing of two rooms by the St. Andrew's Society Ladies' Auxiliary had been completed and was very attractive. New blinds were required for the Nurses' Home and Miss Harrison was authorized to obtain them.

The finance committee, F. A. MacCallum, chairman, reported 1509 hospital days for the month of August at a per diem of \$3.22. Ordinary disbursements totalled \$4866.66 with capital expenditure of \$378.01.

Waterfront Whiffs

Halibut Fleet Sees End of Season Near With Most of Boats Having Only One Trip Left—American Landings This Week Fairly Heavy

With the announcement by the International Fisheries Commission of September 22 as the final date for the issuance of clearances for halibut boats to the banks of Area No. 3, the 1939 halibut fishing season starts down the final lap of the year. This means that the boats will be unable to make any more than two trips this year while for the most of them it will probably be only one.

Some twenty or twenty-five Canadian boats are still operating exclusively for halibut in Area No. 3 while half a dozen or so are cod fishing in Area No. 2. A few of the halibut boats are rounding out the season by salmon packing. As for winter activities, it is anticipated that many of the Prince Rupert halibut boats will again go in training with the Fishermen's Naval Reserve unit while some will probably go in active patrol service in view of war conditions.

Halibut landings at Prince Rupert for the 1939 season up to and including yesterday totalled 13,907,900 pounds of which 6,228,600 pounds was from Canadian vessels and 7,679,300 pounds from Canadian. During the past week landings amounted to 548,100 pounds including 91,100 pounds from Canadian and 457,000 pounds from

American boats. Prices during the week were not quite as strong as the preceding few weeks. For Canadian fish the high price of the week was 7.4c and 5s which the Gulvik, Tramp and Thrasher received for catches of 17,000, 17,000 and 2,600 pounds respectively. The low Canadian price was 7c and 5c paid the Atl and Cape Beale for catches of 8,500 and 40,000 pounds. The high price of the week for American fish was 8.7c and 6c received by the Bravo for 11,900 pounds and the low 7.5c and 5.5c which the Seymour, Tuscan and Lindy were paid for catches of 40,000, 19,000 and 39,000 pounds respectively.

Union steamer Cardena, Capt. John Boden, arrived in port at 12:45 midnight last night from the south and sailed a couple of hours later on her return to Vancouver and waypoints.
