EVACUATED CHILDREN

Mothers Find London Youngsters "Do Their Bit" in New Homes

LONDON, Oct. 2: (CP)-Evacuated children are born "mothers' little helpers" 100 young married couples in Hertfordshire who opened their homes to 213 London children discovered.

"We were dreading the extra work but actually they are so helpful we don't notice it," one of the new mothers said. The children have been going about with the butcher, baker and greengrocer delivering parcels and have also formed a garden squad to dig up weeds.

Three times a week those between 12 and 14 years of age hold a meeting to discuss what they call "doing our bit." They have elected 18 prefects who oversee the behavior

of the others. One of the unwritten rules is that no boy may bring angle worms ini to the house and leave them on the

kitchen table. Another thoughtful plan which involves the little girls is the caring for the "under fives" during play hours to relieve their hostess "aunties" of added responsibility. The girls also wash their own socks

But, with the coming of autumn, the children will attend Hertforshire schools—to be taught by their own teachers, who have been billeted in the same neighborhood.
