Canada At War

TWENTY YEARS AGO

June 28, yesterday, was surely the most momentous anniversary in modern history. On that date, a quarter of a century ago, a youthful assassin in a small Balkan town fired a shot which precipitated 27 nations of the world into the Great War.

June 28, 1914, the murder of the Austrian Archduke Francis Ferdinand, at Sarajevo, by Gavrilo Princip, a Bosnian student. June 28, 1919, the assent of Germany to the Treaty of Versailles. The Serajevo assassination was the pretext, if not the real cause, of the Great War.

The Versailles Treaty sowed the dragon's teeth of which the harvest, it would appear, has still to be garnered. Someone has not inaptly said that in the terms of peace by which a conflict is terminated there are planted the seeds of future wars.

For Canada the cost of the Great War was enormous, in respect not only to its destruction of manpower and its legacy of suffering but also to the immense expenditures of money involved. Nearly 60,000 Canadians were killed or died of war causes during those five years; thousands more have died of causes directly attributable to the war since its close.

Without taking into account the colossal expenditures outlayed since June 28, 1919, on undertakings bearing directly on the war and its consequences, a total of \$1,870,000,000 was spent during those five years on war purposes.

Belgium, Holland And Switzerland Would Be Given Protection Too

If Russia Co-Operates, Finland, Estonia and Latvia Would Also Receive Guarantees From Britain and France

LONDON, June 29: (CP)—Belgium, Holland and Switzerland will receive guarantees under the proposed Anglo-French-Russian mutual assistance pact if the Soviets accept the latest British formula submitted in Moscow, informed quarters reported today.

With efforts continuing to bring the Anglo-French-Russian non-aggression pact to a successful culmination, there is still a measure of tenseness in the situation between Germany and Poland.
