SOUTH RENFREW ELECTION SCANDAL.

At last the bye election of South Renfrew is ordered and there seems to be very little doubt that Hon. George Graham, minister of railways and canals in the Laurier government, will be elected. Nomination day is next Thursday and Mr. Graham will be opposed by Dr. Maloney in the Conservative interest. The election takes place on the 22nd. Thus ends what was fast developing into a political scandal.

It is the custom, when a prominent parliamentarian of either party is defeated, to find another constituency for him. It was done in the case of Hon. William Templeman, who was returned for this district; also, on the other side, in the case of Premier Borden himself, in that of Sir Richard Cartwright and many others. It is the only way in which the country can ensure the presence in parliament of its leading men. And there is nothing more undemocratic in this custom than there is in the custom of allowing a new Minister to be returned unopposed.

Yet in the case of Mr. Graham the Conservative party has taken unheard of steps to prevent his return to parliament. Here is an experienced journalist who has served some years in the Ontario legislature and became the leader of his party in that province, who served several years as Minister of Railways and Canals in the federal house, gaining thereby an accumulated knowledge of public affairs. He is just the kind of man the non-partisan citizen would like to see in the House. Yet the Conservative managers have done their best to make it awkward for him to get back.

The opposition to him in Brockville at the general election cannot be objected to. He went down to defeat with his party. Yet when his party express a desire to have him back in the House, when Sir Wilfrid Laurier reserves a seat for him next to his own, when a Liberal member is found willing to resign in Mr. Graham's favor, the managers of the Conservative party are still obdurate. Such an instance of a wilful disregard of party courtesy, such a petty malignity shown toward this one particular man, inclines one to believe that the party must really be afraid of the return of Mr. Graham.

However, Mr. Graham is now campaigning in South Renfrew and from newspaper accounts it would appear that his treatment by the Conservatives has gained him there the sympathy of the general public outside of party lines, and his election is predicted with confidence.

MINING EXPERTS FOR THE YUKON

Dr. Thompson Has Made Arrangements to Send a Geologist, a Mining Engineer and a Drill Expert Next Year.

Dawson, Y. T., Feb. 4.—Dr. Alfred Thompson, M. P. for Yukon, has arranged to have three men, a geologist, a drill expert and a mining engineer, sent from Ottawa to the Yukon next year to help open promising quartz properties in the various districts. The drill man will operate for the first season near White Horse.

Dr. Thompson hopes to obtain, within a few days, an order that all classes of mail shall come to the Yukon the year around, and to bring about a reduction of the postal order rates to 30 cents. He also has in view the establishment of an experimental farm.

IS FREEZING OVER

Lake Superior Likely to Become a Vast Icefield.

Duluth, Minn., Feb. 4.—Lake Superior is believed to be freezing over its entire area. If so, it will be the first time within the memory of the white man. The icefield is now so great that open water can only be seen from a few points on either shore. With February here, and its fame as an ice making month, there is great reason for believing the entire surface will become solid.

MANY BIG HOTELS

Railway to Have a Complete Chain of Them.

Winnipeg, Feb. 8.—The announcement is made here today that the Grand Trunk Pacific will spare no effort to have its complete chain of hotels from coast to coast completed by the time that the first transcontinental train makes its journey from east to west. All hotels of the company are being built along the same architectural lines as Chateau Laurier and the Fort Garry.
