PRINCETON, June 19: (CP)—Charles Fenske won the Princeton Invitation mile Saturday night. Glen Cunningham was second and Archie San Romani third. Sydney Wooderson, English flash, who was expected to break the record, failed badly in the last quarter, finishing fifth and last. Wooderson had been leading until he was bumped by an American runner and put off his stride. The winner's time was four minutes, eleven seconds.

## BITTER SQUABBLE

A Country Party executive meeting in Sydney could agree on no definite step in this connection and having awaited the result of its deliberations, Mr. Menzies formed an administration from the members of his own party, several of whom were given to understand that their appointments might be ended if a coalition were formed.

The new ministry is as follows: Prime Minister and Treasurer—R. G. Menzies (Victoria). Attorney-General and Minister for Industry—W. M. Hughes (N.S.W.).

Minister for Supply and Development—R. G. Casey (Victoria). Minister for Defence—Col. G. A. Street (Victoria).

Minister for External Affairs—Sir Henry Gullitt (Victoria). Minister for Commerce—Senator George McLeay (South Australia). Minister for the Interior (including Works)—Senator H. S. Pollack (Queensland).

Postmaster-General and Minister for Reconstruction—E. J. Harrison (N.S.W.). Minister for Trade and Customs—J. N. Lawson (N.S.W.).

Minister for Health and Social Services—Sir Frederick Stewart (N.S.W.). Vice-President of the Executive Council, Minister for Civil Aviation, Minister assisting the Minister for National Defence—J. V. Fairbairn (Victoria).

Ministers without Portfolio—J. A. Perkins (N.S.W.), formerly Minister for Customs; P. G. Spender (N.S.W.), to assist Treasurer; Senator P. A. M. McBride (South Australia) to assist Minister for Commerce; Senator H. B. Collett (West Australia); H. E. Holt (Victoria) to assist Minister for Supply.

## New Department

The feature of the administration is the creation of a new department, that of Supply, which is to be in charge of the former Treasurer, Mr. Casey. Three Ministers will therefore be concerned with defence—Mr. Street, Mr. Casey and Mr. Fairbairn, all ex-soldiers.

In his first declaration of policy the new Prime Minister pledged Australia to support Great Britain in the event of war. The government's aim would be the defence of Australia and her standards of life and the use of its influence in the direction of peace.

"But," he proceeded, "I cannot have a defence of Australia which depends on British sea power as its first element, yet refusing co-operation at a time of common danger. The British countries of the world must stand or fall together. Australia's primary responsibilities are in the Pacific, and I look to the day when there will be a concert of Pacific powers involving increased diplomatic contact between Australia and all other countries which fringe the Pacific."

Two days later Mr. Menzies announced the intention of the government to establish Australian legations in the United States and Japan, the diplomatic representatives to be men thoroughly versed in public affairs and enjoying a high status in Australia.

## ROMANCE OF RAIL

### 'Union Pacific' Is Epic Tale Of Construction Of First American Transcontinental Railway

"Union Pacific," a grand scale interpretation of the building of America's first transcontinental railroad, is the feature offering on the screen of the Capitol Theatre here for the first half of this week. Barbara Stanwyck, in a role completely different from any she has previously attempted, and Joel McCrea, as a character strongly reminiscent of the one he portrayed in "Wells Fargo," are co-stars. Miss Stanwyck is a daring, fiery, warm-hearted girl of the west, the daughter of the Union Pacific's first engineer and postmistress at Pittsburg, "the end of the track." She is quite at home outwitting western sharpshooters, comforting homesick Irish laborers, battling Indians on the warpath or engaging in high-powered romance. ## WHAT WE WANT

After we have wanted something a long time and eventually get it we find we do not want it very badly. Women fought tooth and nail for the right to vote and we agreed that they were right in their contentions. Yet when they got the right to vote it was found that in a general way they voted the same way as men.

Just before women obtained the right to vote in Canada the people voted for a prohibition law. An old party heeler who always was against prohibition remarked: "Prohibition has come for good. See what a huge majority they got and from this time on women will vote and they will be all for prohibition." Were they? They were not. It was women who voted for beer parlors just as much as men. In fact, women are the same kind of people as their men. They help to form public opinion much the same as men and they are neither better nor worse than persons of the opposite sex.

In the development of democracy we find many evils, partly as a result of people wanting something they have never had before, not knowing what it was like. Until they were disillusioned by the Russian experiment, many people wanted Socialism. Now they find that the one country that tried it got side-tracked on the way. The dictatorship of the proletariat did not allow enough for human nature. Once the small group of socialist leaders got the reins of government they liked it so well they hung on to it. So we find the growth of a socialist aristocracy which is no more like what Karl Marx planned than chalk is like cheese.

## WHAT DUNNING SAID

Hon. Charles Dunning was recently made a Doctor of Laws at McGill University. At the time he accepted the honor he addressed the graduating students and an interesting paragraph from his speech follows: "For the past few generations we have tended to take for granted the blessings of democratic government and the freedom which it guarantees; much as we do the rising of the sun in the morning. Each succeeding generation is only dimly conscious of the progress made by previous generations. The Canadian of today starts life with all the advantages—material, moral and spiritual—which have been won by all who have gone before. He naturally, therefore, tends to take for granted all the hard-won attainments of the past. We can only hope to continue to hold our progress and to build even better for the future by cultivating an understanding of the value and reality of our institutions of ordered liberty and of our unique system of self-government."

**A BAD GOVERNMENT**

There are people who look upon the present government of Canada as a bad government. That is because some newspapers and some public men speak of it that way. Hon. C. D. Howe, the man who built the local elevator, is a member of that government and, like Mr. Dunning, he too was made a Doctor of Laws only it was by Dalhousie University. In the course of an address to the Alumni Association of that university he said that, if his listeners considered the government at Ottawa a bad government, they should bear in mind that it is a government freely elected by the people. He also pointed out that the so-called bad governments in democratic countries maintain for the people of those countries the highest standard of living in the world today. He might have said that the present democracies lost their liberties to dictators the standard of living began to drop.
