### RUSSIA RUTHLESS

## HAWKS WIN FIRST GAME

Defeated Detroit Red Wings Three To Two Last Night in Opener of National Hockey League

CHICAGO, Nov. 3: (CP)—Chicago Black Hawks, who brought up the rear last season, got off to a better start by defeating Detroit Red Wings 3 to 2 in the opening game last night of the National Hockey League. Fifteen thousand fans saw an exciting contest. Within the last minute of play, Cully Dahlstrom netted the winning counter for the Black Hawks. George Allen, a rookie, and Mush Marsh scored the two other goals for Chicago while Sid Howe and Cecil Dillon were the scorers for Detroit. At the end of the second period the count was 2 to 1 for Chicago.

Tomorrow night the season will open as far as Toronto is concerned with the Maple Leafs at home to Boston Bruins.

On Sunday night Chicago Black Hawks will play the Canadiens in Montreal and the New York Rangers will play at Detroit.

## GOOD YEAR ON GROUNDS

Almost Double Number of Children Attended Gyro Resorts This Summer

In presenting his report for the 1939 season, W. F. Stone, chairman of the Gyro supervised playgrounds committee, told the club at its luncheon Wednesday that it had been the most popular season on the playgrounds. The registrations for the season had totalled 415 as compared with 345 in the year previous while the total attendance at all parks had been 16,614 this year as against 8,499 in 1938.

Most of the credit for increased attendance on the playgrounds was given in the committee report to the instructor, Neil Ross, and his assistants—Kitty Cameron, Jean Cameron, Jean Krause, Frances Robertson, Geraldine Cade, Betty Davey and Bert O'Neill. The interest had also been sustained by a program of diversified special events most of which were on a competitive basis.

Considerable reclamation work had been carried out during the year, thus enlarging the playing area of the parks, much credit in this regard being due the caretaker, Sam Rodin.

The Morse Creek swimming resort had proven of much value and had been very popular, the committee recommending that it be included in all future playground work and further improvements made each year.
