### INDIA DISCUSSES ITS STATUS IN AID OFFER

(Continued from Page One)

speaker who, instancing Palestine, said British foreign policy was anti-Moslem, adding that, in Indian provinces ruled by Congress ministries, British governors had not protected Moslem minorities' interests.

In a fighting speech, Sir Sikander replied that his offer represented the feeling of the martial classes in the Punjab to a man. But, he said, he had also made it clear that he denounced British policy in Palestine and would not allow a single Indian soldier to be sent there. He was in favor of the Indianization of the army on the right lines and that the cost of British soldiers maintained in India for Imperial purposes should be borne by the British Exchequer. The incident terminated on the suggestion of League President Jinnah who gently remarked that, in matters of this importance, Sir Sikander should consult the League before making pronouncements.

The League meeting then proceeded to arrange for deputations to be sent to Moslem countries abroad "to remove the misunderstandings created by Congress leaders that the Moslems of India are not patriots" and to the League of Nations "to expose the congress attitude towards the minorities in India."

### Echoes of Palestine

But for the fact that the Congress and the Moslems are at loggerheads over this latter question, a great deal more would be heard about Palestine from Indian politicians. In the Moslem press and on public platforms loud are the denunciations of British "repression" of their co-religionists in Palestine and of the policy of thrusting the Jews into the Arab country.

Feeling is heightened by the sanctity attached to the Moslem shrines in Palestine, especially the great mosque at Jerusalem where the noted Indian Moslem, Maulana Mohammed Ali, lies buried. The government of India, traditionally anxious about British foreign policy's repercussions on India's 80,000,000 Moslems, has kept the British government in constant touch with the state of feeling here.

Indian Moslem leaders attended the recent conference of Arab representatives at Cairo. Some have proceeded to London to impress Indian feeling on British statesmen. But, as one of the deputation, a member of the United Provinces Assembly, sadly remarked: "The policy of the Congress does not permit us to take up the Palestine issue with the earnestness demanded by the situation." Twenty years have passed since the Congress and Indian Moslems combined forces as a world power. A gulf now divides them on many questions of Indian internal policy.

### Gandhi Speaks

The Congress might support a pro-Arab agitation as a part of a political bargain but one is not yet in sight. The Congress condemns verbally British policy in Palestine but is not very interested in it. The intellectuals sympathize with the German Jews and so feel that they cannot be very heated about their admission into Palestine.

"If ever there could be justifiable war in the name of humanity," writes Mahatma Gandhi, "a war against Germany to prevent the wanton persecution of a whole race would be completely justified."

But the cry of a National Home in Palestine does not appeal to him. "If I were a Jew and were born in Germany and earned my livelihood there, I would claim Germany as my home, even as the tallest Gentile German may, and challenge him to shoot me or cast me into a dungeon. I would refuse to be expelled or to submit to discriminating treatment."

In other words, Mr. Gandhi's remedy, as it was for the Czechs, is non-violence. Of the Czechs he said at the time of the international crisis: "If they had known the use of non-violence as a weapon for the defence of national honor, they would have faced the whole of Germany with Italy thrown in."

"They would have spared England and France the humiliation of suing for a peace which was no peace and, to save their honor, they would have died to the man without shedding the blood of the robber."

### Newspaper Opinion

The leading Congress newspaper in Calcutta is sceptical about the Mahatma's panacea for the Jews. It is noteworthy that Mr. Gandhi confesses that he does not know what the Congress working committee would have done if war had come. The Chief Secretary of the

### WINNIPEG WHEAT PRICE

WINNIPEG, Jan. 20: (CP)—Winnipeg wheat prices stiffened when they were up 3/4¢ to 5/8¢ on Wednesday with May closing at 62 1/2¢. Yesterday they were unchanged to 7/8¢ lower with May at 62 3/4¢.

Punjab Unionist (non-Congress) Party, which Sir Sikander Hyat Khan leads, says that the committee was really debating whether, in the event of war, it should negotiate a bargain with Britain and offer to help her for a price or should declare India's neutrality.

He adds: "The population for which all the Congress leaders put together can at all claim to speak does not contribute more than 10 or 15 per cent of the personnel of the Indian Army." From which he concludes that Sir Sikander had no more right to offer the martial classes' help to Britain than anybody else.

A further interesting point is that the Bengal Hindu Samha, which is a Hindu counterpart of the Moslem League, is now openly condemning the Congress Party's creed of independence. The Sabha is Nationalist and usually sides with the Congress against the British government but champions specifically Hindu religious and communal claims.
