EDITORIALS

STRONG SUSPICION

There seems to be a strong suspicion that the bombing at Munich recently was carried out at the instigation of the German army officers or others opposed to the Hitler regime. It is evident on the face of it, that many of the thoughtful Germans cannot be at all pleased at the Hitler policy. Thousands of people in that country would have liked the bombing to have been successful but it was not and it is possible that there will have to be loss of valuable lives before Hitlerism has been eradicated.

HOLDS WORLD RECORD

This is too odd to tell in the news columns but it is interesting. At Savona, British Columbia, every man joined the colors during the First World War and not one returned. All were killed. We wonder if these men, who died gloriously, were any worse off than the men who remained at home and lived to see a second world war begin.

PANCANADIANISM

The French language newspaper "Le Jour," published in Montreal, a strong advocate of better relations between English and French speaking Canadians, is out with a definite plan for promoting panCanadianism. It objects to speaking of people officially as French-Canadians, Scandinavians, Jewish, Scottish, Irish, etc., but would instead speak of all as Canadians. It would abolish all special Canadian groups, wage war on separatism and isolation stimulate closer contacts between Canadians of various languages, faiths and origin, increase bi-lingualism, arrange free exchanges of teachers, organize mixed summer camps, stimulate tourist trade to all parts of Canada, repeal disruptive statutes, arrange for uniform history text books, uphold democratic ideals, educate the masses to look to a strong central government which would be a bond of unity upholding a great charter of freedom and to summon once a year a conference of groups in all provinces with a view to encouraging the growth of a single nation.

The idea of the organization is splendid and carries out the same ideal that has for many years acuated most of the newspapers and statesmen in all parts of the country.

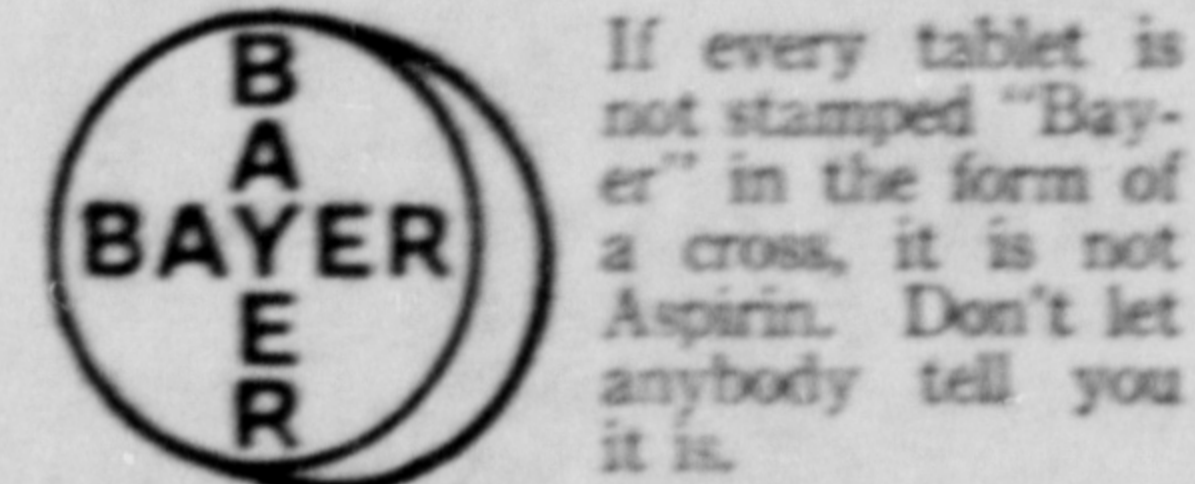
