5. WAR RELIEF Hundreds of thousands of Polish refugees in countries adjacent to Poland are in dire need. Through the International Red Cross Society at Geneva, help is being sent to these unfortunate people. Your contribution will help to provide food and clothing luring the coming winter.

2 From 1914 to 1918 the Canadian Red Cross provided scores of ambulances to convey the sick and wounded in France and England. Now the need for ambulances faces us again. It seems likely that the demand will be greater than during the last war.

Again the Red Cross wishes to be able to send socks, cigarettes, candy and other comforts to the boys at the front. During the last war, 341,325 cases of supplies were sent overseas. The Society sent sixty pounds of food per month to every Canadian prisoner of war, in addition to tobacco, medical supplies, clothing and books. Should the occasion arise, we must be prepared to do so again.

X-Ray equipment, surgical supplies and dressings must be purchased almost immediately. During the last war, thousands of cases of supplies were sent to England and France. Thousands of dollars were contributed to equip a ward in the St. John Ambulance Brigade Hospital at Etaples, France.



6. PEACETIME WORK OF THE RED CROSS The regular work of the Red Cross in Canada must be continued. Outpost hospitals and nursing stations must be maintained and the work of the Red Cross in frontier districts must be carried on. The activities of the Junior Red Cross must be developed. The normal cost of this great effort is a million dollars a year.
