I wish to correct published accounts with regard to my accident up in the mountains. The facts are as follows:

My wife and son came up and arrived at the cabin at about o'clock in the afternoon of Decemper 27. They found me sitting by the stove with a broken ankle. had made some crutches but they were useless on account of depth of the snow. I had very little wood and was quite unable to get any and the temperature was I believe, about 20 below zero. My wife stayed up with me keeping the fire going all night with whatever fuel she could find and my boy went down and brought up a horse the next day and they both brought me down. The day after the police came out to the ranch and brought 30.28 me in to the hospital.

I firmly believe that, if my wife and son had not come up, I would not have been able to get down without aid.
