FIGHT OR STARVE

Germany is being rationed just as badly as if the country were at war. Even the necessities of life are scarce. Many people are hungry all the time and with little hope of improvement.

One view of the present European situation is that some sudden coup will be made on the Mediterranean rather than at Danzig and that the German people will then be told it is a question of "fight or starve." It is thought they will decide to follow the orders of Hitler and fight.

Evidently, the German people are doing a lot of thinking these days. They are very tired of the present situation and something must be done soon or there will be revolt. The views of some military observers are that the plan of campaign is for Japan to try to draw vessels of the British navy away from Europe to handle the situation in China and then will be the time for action in Europe.

The present time is evidently chosen for the move in China in order to try to prevent Great Britain completing an arrangement with Russia.

THE MIKADO

It is not only in Prince Rupert that "The Mikado," the Gilbert and Sullivan opera, is popular. WIN FOR LAUNDRY

Vance missed a good opening and Morgan saved a splendid header from Houston high up in the corner, after Gomez had centred well. Currie cleared a dangerous situation. Davies shot hard and true but Smith caught and cleared. Morgan was very smart to save a header that skimmed off Ronalds' head. He seemed to have a long shot from Vance stopped but it got away from him and the Laundry were two up. Christison, Smith and Bryant tried till the end but there was no more scoring.
