Successful Affair Takes Place at Home of Mrs. W. J. Lineham

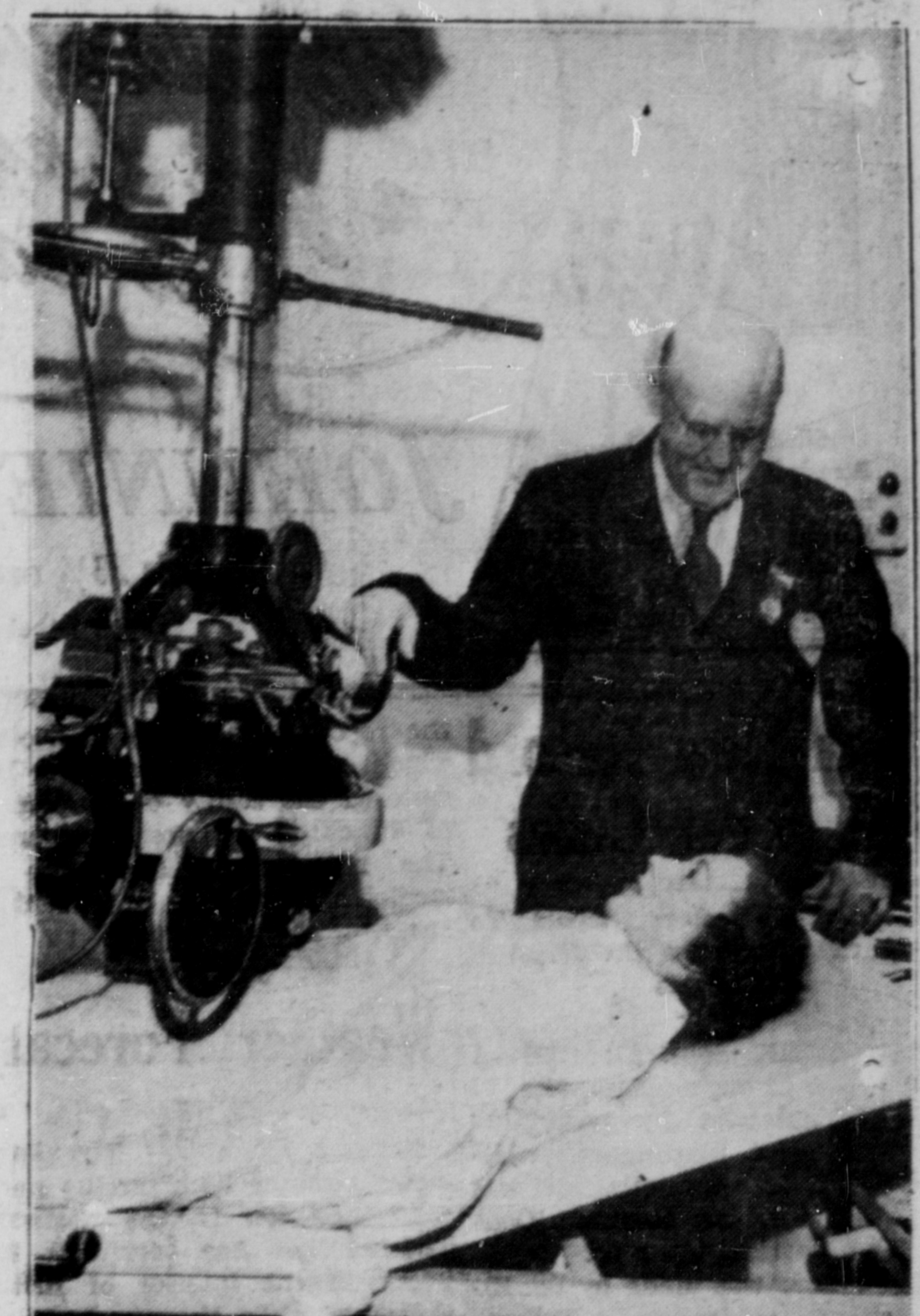
