CANADIENS WIN TWICE

Still Have Chance To Get In National Hockey League Play-offs—Maple Leafs Also Win Couple

NEW YORK, Feb. 20: (CP) — Week-end play in the National Hockey League was productive of some surprise results which may have an important bearing on play-off positions.

The Toronto Maple Leafs and Montreal Canadiens both added to their credit in the standing columns. At the Maple Leaf Gardens Saturday night two goals scored by Toronto in the second period gave the team a two to one victory over the New York Rangers and last night the Leafs took a four to three overtime victory from the Black Hawks at Chicago.

The Canadiens, at Montreal Saturday night, scored five goals in a hectic third period to defeat the Americans seven to two and then went down to New York last night to win again by a count of five to four. The Canadiens had been regarded as being just about out of the race as far as play-off position was concerned but now, only one game behind the Chicago Black Hawks, they would appear to still have a very definite chance providing the breaks go their way.

The Detroit Red Wings, by virtue of a four to one victory over the league leading Boston Bruins last night, went into fifth place ahead of the Chicago Black Hawks.
