Alberni has collected the sum of \$1400 so far for publicity work and before the drive is over, it expects to make the total \$2,000. The money is to be spent in advertising the district. LONG BEACH PLAN

Vancouver papers tell of the success of the city of Long Beach, California, under a plan of city managership which is rather different from the one suggested by the local Chamber of Commerce. Under the plan the city council is elected by the ward system and the elected members choose one of their number as mayor. No member of the council or the mayor is paid. The council appoints a city manager and civic officials and the administration of the city is turned over to them, the council meeting only for a few hours once a month. The manager is paid \$10,-000 a year.

If no special charter can be secured for Prince Rupert, it is possible that this Long Beach plan might be adopted here. No very high priced manager would be necessary. Possibly the sum formerly paid to a mayor and council would be sufficient to pay the manager. Something like \$4,000 a year should be plenty. If one of the present members of the staff were chosen the amount would be considerably less in addition to the present salary. This phase of the scheme is worth considering.

SCHOOL GARDENS

We have on hand a very interesting series of articles on gardening issued by the manufacturers of one of the well known brands of fertilizers in which two methods of conducting school gardens are outlined. At Dearborn, Michigan, the horticultural course includes horticultural units of study as a part of elementary grades. Gardening is a science course in the junior high school and horticulture is a science course in the senior high school.

Mention is made that where sufficiently large areas of land for school garden purposes are not available within convenient distance of the schools another plan is available for practical training in gardening which has been found to work out satisfactorily. This is known as the school-home gardening project. By contacting the parents plots of land are made available at the homes of the children and these plots are inspected at intervals by the science teacher. Also visiting teachers, city officials and others are taken to inspect these plots and it is found that many students take a pride in them. These school-homes gardens are the natural corollary of the Parent-teacher movement.

LOS ANGELES, April 18 .- Joe Louis, world's heavyweight boxing champion, last night added Jack Roper, 36-year-old former Mississippi marine, to his list of one-round victims which during the last year has included Max Schmeling and John Henry Lewis. The fight, scheduled for ten

rounds, lasted two minutes and twenty seconds. The fighters started warily and then Roper lashed out left and right hooks to the jaw which sur-

prised the Brown Bomber. Louis then sent Roper to the canvas with a resounding hard right to the jaw and the ex-marine was unable to get up before

the ten count. Louis weighed 20114 pounds; Roper, 20434.
