IS OFF TO WET START

Precipitation For January And February in Prince Rupert Has Been Exceptionally Low

For volume of precipitation, Prince Rupert is getting off to a good start this year. During the month of February 11.03 inches was recorded, bringing the total for the first two months of the year to 21.54 inches or more than twice as much as in the same period a year ago. The precipitation this February compared with but 1.8 inches in February 1938 while for the opening two months of last year the aggregate was 10.4 inches.

With the greater precipitation, there has been less sunshine so far this year. A total of 47.1 hours of sunshine was recorded this February as against 77.1 hours in February 1938, the total sunshine for this year to date being 75.4 hours in comparison with 110.4 hours in the first two months of last year.

The temperature range was considerably lower this February than last. The February weather summary, as announced today by S. J. Mellor, Digby Island, Dominion meteorologist, is as follows:

Lowest barometer reading at sea level, 29.11 on February 11.
Maximum temperature, 47 on February 16.
Minimum temperature, 10 on February 8.
Mean temperature, 34.6.
Total precipitation, 11.03 inches.
Hours of sunshine, 47.1.
Maximum wind velocity, 37 miles per hour, southeast, February 16.

The ship will be larger than the Baby Clipper which made experimental flights last year.

PREMIER PLEASED

Appreciation of Reception Here—Met Young People—City Looks Good

Before leaving on his return to Victoria yesterday Premier Pattullo expressed pleasure at the cordial manner in which he had been received everywhere in the city and particularly at the splendid turnout at the meeting Monday night. He said it was difficult for him to visit Prince Rupert often but he was in close touch with affairs here all the time and only wished he had sufficient leisure to enable him to spend a week or two occasionally in the city.

Mr. Pattullo said he was particularly enthused over the manner in which the younger men of the city were taking hold and making themselves felt. He hoped this would continue for the future progress and prosperity of the city depended upon the young men. He had enjoyed meeting a number of the sons and grandsons of former citizens and he believed they had in them the stuff that had made their forebears brave the rigors of life on the frontier and make homes for themselves in what was only a short time ago a wilderness.

The appearance of Prince Rupert was being improved by the two fine new buildings in the Post Office and the Hospital. Mr. Pattullo said he felt that the city would benefit very considerably from the defence activities in Prince Rupert and neighborhood and for this it had to thank very largely the minister of national defence, Hon. Ian McKenzie, who was responsible for the policy under which these defences were being erected. What was needed now was an industry using part of the raw material which was so abundant in this neighborhood.

With regard to the establishment of a pulp or paper industry in this vicinity, Mr. Pattullo said the government would offer every encouragement to it. Once an industry city was started here he felt that the
