Customs Revenue Here Falls Off

Collections For This February Were Lowest For Any Single Month In Eight Years

Customs and excise collections at the port of Prince Rupert for the month of February shrunk to \$5,268.82, the smallest figure for any single month since January 1931. So far this year collections have totalled \$15,020.88 in comparison with \$22,767.24 in the first two months of last year.
