EDITORIALS

PROFIT SYSTEM

The profit system will be under fire during the coming fall and winter and, for that reason, it is wise sometimes to hear the other side. Russia is the only country today where the profit system has been abolished and it is too soon to judge of the results there. The following comes from Boston, Massachusetts:

"The prospect for profit is the mainspring of economic activity and around this has centred our great industrial progress of the past 150 years. The release of individual energy under such a stimulus is the secret of the success of the great American system and the key to progress. Individuals will work hard and long to provide for themselves and their dependents. But take away personal incentive, then the contribution of individuals to the community at large is substantially lowered. This has been demonstrated over and over again in various attempts at collective living. Communism was tried in New England 300 years ago.

"The Plymouth Colony adopted a plan whereby the colonists 'all worked for a common storehouse from which all were fed and clothed.' But actual famine stared them in the face as 'the emigrants did not labor' and 'paralysis was affecting the settlement.' In consequence of this situation Governor Bradford permitted the breaking up of the contract and assigned each family its own parcel of land to raise its own food. 'The cheerful effort of personal energy succeeded to the sloth of communal interest and plenty followed.' In the course of time the spirit of the Massachusetts Bay pioneers built up a flourishing world commerce and laid the foundation for private enterprise in this country. Under this system the United States with less than seven per cent of the world's population accounts for nearly as much wealth as all the other countries combined.

INTELLECTUAL PRIDE

Lord Baldwin thinks intellectual pride is conceit and conceit is the most vulgar thing in the world. And yet Lord Baldwin is only partly right. Those people who are clever did not make themselves clever. They did not even make themselves industrious and able to develop their cleverness. At the same time it must be a wonderful thing to be very clever, except that there are so few other clever people with whom to associate and to associate with people who are not clever would be a bore. A person who is clever should glory in the cleverness but should carefully avoid making any display of it. He should feel that he is one of God's chosen people but should always avoid showing superiority.

We have known people who thought themselves clever because they attended a certain kind of school or university, thus having an advantage over others, an advantage which usually is provided at the expense of the commonplace hard workers of the country. They often display a vulgar conceit. To be clever is wonderful but to parade it is snobbish, vulgar.

The best engagement of the day was fought out between the Los Angeles youngsters, Welby van Horn and Jack Kramer, and the Stanford University team, Bob Low and Larry Dee.

Plan Addition To Boys' Town

Three Hundred More Youths To Be Admitted To Colony

WINNIPEG, Aug. 14: (CP)—Enlarging Boys' Town at Omaha, Nebraska, will enable 300 more abandoned youths to enter the famous home for boys, Father G. L. Demers, assistant to Father Flanagan, who started the colony in 1917, said during a visit here.

The home for "abandoned, neglected and some wayward boys" now houses 200 of whom only 10 percent are problem boys, he said. Two lads from Saskatchewan are in the "town" and 27 states of the union are represented. There are 19 different nationalities and more than 2,800 boys have lived in the place.

Fine buildings grace the lawns and there are spacious playgrounds. The football squad was unbeaten in five seasons and the basketball team has been invited to play in Honolulu.

Supervised self-government is the system employed. A mayor, civic commissioner and principal judge and others are elected. Elections are held every six months.

MRS. BRASS AT OTTAWA

Prince Rupert Woman One of Three
In Camp for D.C.R.A. Annual Meet

OTTAWA, Aug. 14: (CP)—Four hundred and fifty crack marksmen from all parts of Canada are encamped at the Connaught Ranges here for the annual shoot of the Dominion of Canada Rifle Association which opens today. Some of them hope to qualify here for the Bisley team next year.

There are three women among the marksmen, one of them being Mrs. William Brass of Prince Rupert.

Strong representations have come from the east and west. British Columbia, Alberta and Manitoba contribute about 15 riflemen each. A like number come from the Maritimes and Quebec while Ontario is represented by more than 200. In addition, about 50 cadets from various Canadian schools are shooting for prizes over the miniature ranges.

Trophies Missing

The trophy room of the administration building, overlooking the rolling ranges, is bare of international trophies. The Bisley team arrived home from the National Rifle Association with nothing to place on display. The Kolapore Cup, won by Canada last year, was recaptured by the mother country last month.

Intra-Empire flavor is given by the presence of a team of cadets, chosen from the public schools of England. They will meet Canadian cadets in a duel for possession of the Michael Faraday Trophy, now held by Canada.

Capt. A. C. Lucas of Toronto will seek to retain the Governor-General's gold medal when all marksmen go to the firing mounds Thursday for the shooting of the first stage of the classic. The leading 150 will enter the final stage Saturday.

Capt. Lucas, Capt. George Patrick of Ottawa and Mrs. Gwen Spencer Hethley of Victoria tied for first place last year. Capt. Lucas and Capt. Patrick shot off for the medal. Mrs. Hethley was not eligible as the medal is limited to members of His Majesty's forces.

Deadlock In Golf Tourney

Gene Sarazen, Denny Shute And
Ralph Guldahl Tie In Dapper
Dan Contest

PITTSBURGH, August 14:—Three established stars of the golfing world—Gene Sarazen, Denny Shute and Ralph Guldahl—battled winds and rain at Wildwood Country Club yesterday to finish in a deadlock at 287 for first place in the \$10,000 Dapper Dan golf tournament. None was able to come close to par figures as a stiff cross wind and rain whipped across the course.

Sarazen found the going more difficult than the others and, after leading the parade for three days, he came home with a disastrous 77 on the par 70 course.

SPORT CHAT

W. W. Maxfield, British national cycling sprint champion, qualified for the final in a London championship event but lost when his chain snapped in the last lap. F. W. Tickler won by a length.

A selected Holland cricket team will play a team of the Marylebone Cricket Club at Lord's in London today and tomorrow.

National Hunt stewards have passed an amendment by which the top weight in the Grand National need not be more than 163 pounds as compared with the present 176. Minimum weight was lowered to not less than 130 pounds as against the former 140.

Struck on the head by a cricket ball during a match at New Cross, Frank Hagger, 14, died in a London hospital a few hours later.

Mayor R. J. Gilbertson of Essendon, Australia, pays admission fees at six cents a head for 80 boys whose fathers are on relief each time the Essendon rugby club plays at home.

Three new clubs—Kidderminster Harriers, Worcester City and Burton Town—have been admitted to the Birmingham Football League, bringing the membership to 13.

Although he had come nearly 3,000 miles for the race, an American runner, confronted with a misplaced hurdle during an international track meet at Oxford, refused to protest.

Babe Didrikson, famous American golfer, playing on the New South Wales Club's course at La Perouse, outdrew her male opponents and was in deadly form on the greens.

WASHINGTON, D. C., August 14: (CP)—Chosen as one of the six prettiest government employees, 26-year old Mabel Sugnet has definite ideas on what part beauty plays in a business office.

A fair-skinned, soft-voiced brunette with hazel eyes, Miss Sugnet divides her time between administrative and secretarial work in the Works Progress Administration offices here.

"Beauty can be a handicap in business," she said. "So many executives think anybody that is beautiful can't possibly be intelligent. Of course there are exceptions among executives but they are few and far between."
