

# TALKING OF DEMOCRACY

Canadian Institute of Economics And Politics Now In Session

ORRILLIA, Ont., August 14: (CP)—Leaders in several fields in Canada and the United States will discuss the future of democracy before the Canadian Institute of Economics and Politics, which opened its eighth annual assembly at Geneva Park, Lake Couchiching, today.

Prominent Canadians scheduled to take part are Premier Angus MacDonald, of Nova Scotia; Denton Massey, M. P., Toronto; Agnes C. Macphail, M. P. for Grey-Bruce; Lt. Col. George A. Drew, Ontario Conservative leader; Armand Viau, Department of Mines, Quebec; R. L. Calder, K. C., and Mme. Pierre Casgrain, Montreal; Dr. C. A. Curtis, and Dr. W. A. Mackintosh, Queen's University, Kingston; B. K. Sandwell, Toronto; Dr. B. Wilkinson, University of Toronto; Dr. C. E. Phillips, Ontario College of Education, Toronto; Grattan O'Leary, Ottawa; and Dr. S. F. Maine, University of Western Ontario, London.

This year's gathering will deal with the theory of democratic government, review its virtues and shortcomings and perhaps even estimate its future under the grinding pressure of world forces. The title given the discussion is "The Crisis of Democracy."

For two weeks, students on the wooded shores of Lake Couchiching will listen to some of the continent's leading thinkers and enter debates in open forum following each address.

Dr. Max Lerner, former editor of The Nation and now president of Williams College, Mass., will lead off with an analysis of "Political Opinion in a Democracy." It will be the first of three lectures by Dr. Lerner on characteristics of the democratic system. Premier MacDonald will examine democracy vis-a-vis the totalitarian regimes in an opening-day talk on "Democracy Re-examined."

**Canada's Policy**  
At later meetings Mr. Massey will deal with the question "Under what conditions should Canada support British foreign policy?" and Miss Macphail will examine "The Problem of Government Efficiency in Canada." Col. Drew will speak on "The Question of Party Government in Canada."

A prominent speaker will be Dr. Hans Simons of the New School for Social Research in New York. Dr. Simons, who is a former director of the Deutsche Hochschule fur Politik in Berlin, will give four lectures reviewing recent political international developments.

He will deal with the main aspects of the slow shift of power positions culminating in the events of 1938-39 as well as with the changes in political technique brought to the international field by one-party rule and totalitarian propaganda.

## DROWNED IN NAAS RIVER

### Chief Alfred Skadeen of Aiyansh Loses His Life While Fishing

Alfred Skadeen, well known Indian chief of Aiyansh on the Naas River, was drowned off Ten Mile Point in the Naas River off the mouth of Nasoga Gulf at the end of the week. His body was brought to the city by Provincial Constable Irving of Mill Bay Saturday night and will be retained here until the end of the fishing season when it will be sent to the home village for interment.

Skadeen is believed to have fallen off his boat while engaged in fishing for Arrandale cannery. His boat was found empty and the fact was reported to Constable Irving who instituted dragging operations. The body was found in fifteen feet of water.

Skadeen had been subject to fainting spells and it is believed he had been seized with one and fell overboard. The deputy coroner was satisfied that drowning had been accidental.

Deceased was sixty years of age, a widower and is survived by a son, Reginald Skadeen.

Last night there was a memorial service over the body at the chapel of B. C. Undertakers with Chief Alfred Livingstone in charge and the Aiyansh Band, under leadership of Benjamin A. Munro, taking part. Organist was Arthur Mercer and there were speeches by Chiefs George Robinson, Titus Minesqu, Arthur Derrick, Isaac Wright, Matthew Gurney, James MacKay (Port Simpson), Stephen Skadeen, Frank Tait and Paul Mercer, the latter pronouncing the benediction.

The band again played a dirge over the body this afternoon.

### THE MANAGER PLAN

Editor, Daily News:  
Referring to the item in Saturday's News with regard to plebiscite on City Manager Plan, may we again briefly outline the plan proposed by the joint committee.

A council of five members would be elected for a three year term, serving without pay. A Mayor to be chosen from the members of the council by themselves.

The council would appoint a trained municipal administrator as city manager, who would have control over all civic departments and employees. The council would not interfere in any way with the employment or removal of city employees or in the operation of any of the departments, their powers would be restricted to matters of policy, acting in an advisory capacity to the manager and passing upon matters of finance. The manager would prepare an annual budget estimate to be submitted to the council and would also report at each monthly council meeting.

The joint committee feels that this plan is far preferable to the old Mayor and Council system and would result in reduced cost of operation with increased efficiency in all civic departments, because the manager is specially trained for this work and is not, like the mayor and council, a part time amateur.
