Building Up A Town

Above all, never spend a dollar out of town that you can use for the same purpose in town.



Following the all-day rain Sunday when most gardeners sat before the fire and enjoyed a good book instead of prowling among the flowers, nearly everybody was in the garden Monday evening and considerable cleaning up was done. It was interesting to notice that scarcely a household was not represented among the workers.

Spring flowers are always appreciated but they are more for the people who raise them than for the people of the city generally or for visitors. There are very few visitors in the city at this time of year and often the weather is so unpleasant that even the home folks cannot spend much time in the garden. Later we have thousands of visitors and they are keenly interested in the gardens. That is the reason why so many people are turning their chief attention to summer blooming flowers instead of the possibly more attractive spring flowers.

A little over a week ago I visited the Canadian National Railway gardens and found the rockery near the pond beautiful with primulas of the denticulata variety, a delightful splash of mauve. The only trouble was that very few people saw the flowers because the weather was cold and not conducive to garden rambles. To a large extent the flowers were wasted.

I am not suggesting that we should not have spring flowers but I do suggest that our great effort should be devoted to making the gardens as presentable as possible when most of our visitors are in the city and when the weather is such that we can be out to enjoy the garden to the best advantage. Unfortunately, there are comparatively few summer-blooming rock plants so the spring flowers in the rockeries are almost the only ones available.

For those who have rock gardens, I suggest that a few of the low growing annuals help to brighten them up in the late summer. They may not grow as large but they will provide color at a time when there is little in the rockery. —H.F.P.

Whifflets From The Waterfront

With a good-sized list of passengers, C.N.R. steamer Prince Rupert, Capt. H. E. Nedden, arrived in port at eleven o'clock this morning from Vancouver, Powell River and Ocean Falls. The vessel will sail at 4 p.m. for Anyox and Stewart whence she will return here tomorrow evening southbound.

There were in all seventy passengers aboard the steamer Princess Louise which was in port yesterday afternoon southbound from Skagway to Vancouver. Twenty-two passengers disembarked here, these including some dozen or so witnesses from Atlin for the James Anderson murder trial at the session of the Supreme Court Assizes. Four embarked aboard the vessel at this port for Vancouver.

Capt. Paul Armour, manager of

the Armour Salvage Co., returned to port early this afternoon with the company's service boat Pachena from a trip to Vancouver. The Pachena brought north a scow in tow.

Imperial Oil Co.'s tanker Albertalite, Capt. Alex Mosher and with Capt. Larry Thomson on board as pilot, sailed at noon yesterday after discharging fuel oil at the company's local tanks. The Albertalite proceeds from here to Victoria to go into dry dock before going on to California for a load of crude.

Mr. and Mrs. Mace of South Africa are tourist passengers aboard the steamer Prince Rupert today. They came north from Vancouver and will make the trip to Anyox and Stewart, disembarking here tomorrow evening and proceeding East by Friday evening's train.

Robert Parsons, son of Mr. and Mrs. R. C. Parsons, arrived home on the Prince Rupert this morning to spend the summer vacation. He was accompanied by his mother who has been visiting in Vancouver.
