Although Italy is neutral in the present war, world fencing championships scheduled to be held in Rome have been indefinitely postponed, as many champion fencers are in the armies of fighting nations.

Badminton, which has enjoyed increasing popularity during the last few years, will "go under" in Britain for the duration of the war, as badminton courts have been requisitioned by the army.

There's little hope of pro ice hockey in England this winter and an official of the British Ice Hockey Association said it was probable the B.I.H.A. would discontinue for the duration of the war.

The Cambridge University rowing crew of Capetown, South Africa, which has completed a successful tour of South Africa has left for England.

Recalling the cross-country runs organized by the British Amateur Athletic Association for the Services during the First Great War, officials of the Association said some such contests may be reinaugurated soon.

Arthur Pritchard, centre forward with Colchester of the Southern League, has joined the Scots Greys.

Toward the end of a strenuous rugby season, Aubrey Hinman, secretary of the Hamilton (South Africa) rugby club, had to make 32 replacements in the club's eight teams one weekend. Seven new men were put into one junior squad.

Editorial

MORAL REARMAMENT

The danger of working a reform to death was shown in connection with the present international situation. When Ramsay MacDonald was Prime Minister of Great Britain a wave of moral rearmament passed over the country. It was not called by that name but it was the same thing and it caused the British people to start scrapping their ships, reducing their army and trying to show a good example to the rest of the world, an example of trustfulness, brotherly love, Christian charity. At the same time Italy and Germany were teaching their young people the glories of war, the need of real armament and the childishness and weakness of Great Britain. They looked upon the British Empire as easy prey for themselves. The British were decadent, soft, easy, unworthy foes for a virile people. They were distinctly on the down grade.

The result of this policy was that, when the fateful Munich parley took place, the British had to crawl down and wait until they had rearmament before they dared meet the German attack. Moral rearmament would not stop the rape of Poland unless it had been applied in time to Germany and her allies.

When it was found that Germany could not be stopped except by force, the enemies of the British and some of their mistaken friends started a moral rearmament campaign in United States, Canada and Great Britain. Did they carry this campaign into Germany and Italy and Russia? They were not allowed to do so. The campaign, which was good in principle, served rather to weaken the democracies while not in any way injuring the dictatorships.

The place to start a moral rearmament campaign next time will be in Japan, Italy, Russia and Germany. Once they have learned the lessons, it will be easy enough to persuade Britain and United States to fall in line.

HINTS AID HOUSEWIVES

Government Pamphlets Urge British Women To Keep Week's Store of Tinned Foods

LONDON, Sept. 30: (CP)—Although English housewives are urged not to overload their cupboards with hoarded goods, the government, through pamphlets of general advice in times of emergency, encourages each home to keep a week's supply of non-perishable things on hand.

Foods, stored in tins, that would last indefinitely, were suggested as most practical. Corned beef, lamb tongue, salmon, sardines, herring, dried vegetables, condensed, sweetened and evaporated milk, sugar, treacle, cocoa, chocolate and tomato puree would supply a well-balanced menu for one week.

One dozen eggs would round out the larder. Officials suggest these might be picked in larger quantities if arrangements could not be made to replenish the dozen weekly. Also the possibility of being cut off from baker's bread should be guarded against by the inclusion of cream of tartar and baking soda, which together with dried milk and water would produce soda bread.

Detailed supplies issued in the pamphlet as a guide to an average household of five listed in pounds, includes:

Tinned foods: Corned beef, 8; salmon, 4; sardines (or herrings), 4; milk, whole condensed, sweetened, 2; milk, whole dried, 3; or evaporated, 7½; black treacle, 1; golden syrup, 1; tomatoes, 6; tomato puree, 2; and carrots, 3.

Other foods: Sugar, 4; chocolate (plain, eating), 1; cocoa, loose, 1; prunes, 1; apricots, dried, 1; raisins, ½; rice, 2; cornflour, ½; haricot beans, 1; dried green peas, 1; lentils, ½; oatmeal, 2; plain biscuits, 5; dripping, 1½; lard, 1; white flour, 10; bacon, 1; eggs, one dozen tea, ½; salt, 1; cream of tartar, 1; baking soda, ½; and dried onions, one packet.
