in operation whereby The Canadian Press supplies the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation with a greatly enlarged bulletin service of news for emission over its national network. This new set-up has been reached after prolonged negotiations between representatives of C.B.C. and a special committee of The Canadian Press, including in its membership nearly half the personnel of your Board of Directors.

"Because of the greatly increased cost this enlargement of the radio bulletin service entails, The Canadian Press has asked for and is to receive financial indemnification from the C.B.C. for the expenses incidental to the preparation and editing of these bulletins, as well as other necessary outlay with respect to the service. This indemnity is now fixed at \$20,000 a year, and will so remain during the currency of the agreement, which, however, may be determined at any time on three months' notice given in writing by either of the contracting parties.

"The advantages of having a working arrangement of this kind with the C.B.C. are so obvious as to render unnecessary any attempt to catalogue them at length. But the fact that it places The Canadian Press in a paramount and dominant position as the supplier of news on the air to the whole Dominion, from coast to coast, is in itself, one submits, a circumstance of profound significance, because it is clear recognition by constituted authority, not only of the reliability of our news services, but also of the genuinely national character of our co-operative organization. Under this arrangement Canadian Press news must not be tainted by propaganda or even comment nor cheapened by sponsorship. All the bulletins so prepared and broadcast will be given to the people of Canada through the definitely acknowledged courtesy of The Canadian Press.

"I am sure I speak for all present in expressing the appreciation of The Canadian Press to the Prime Minister of Canada, Rt. Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King, for the honor he has done our organization in the appointment of R. K. Carnegie, Ottawa Parliamentary Superintendent, as press representative for Canada on C.P.S.S. Empress of Australia. Their Majesties' visit will be an event of red-letter record, not only in the annals of Canada, but as well in the opportunity it will give The Canadian Press to prove its value and aptitude for service as a national institution. The finest traditions are safe in Mr. Carnegie's hands.

"Close in sequence after the royal visit, a Dominion general election may add another major job to this year's heavy program for The Canadian Press throughout the entire network of its member newspapers. The campaign assignments, the special reporting a Dominion election always entails, the collection and tabulation of polling day returns, will of course necessitate a considerable expense, which will be met by a special assessment on the members, as soon as an accurate estimate of the amount involved can be obtained.

"This suggests a brief summary of the financial outlook for the coming year. It is pleasing to be able to announce that notwithstanding an estimated increase of nearly \$30,000 in the wages of the operating staff, next year's assessment will be only about \$5,000 higher than that of 1938. This result has been reached by the elimination of the \$6,000 radio estimate carried for so many years, by a reduction in the cost of the West Indies service, and by a general scaling down of expenditures effected by the Finance Commission and approved by the Board of Directors.

"The two years during which I have been privileged to serve you as President have brought their full quota of new and difficult problems to The Canadian Press but they have all been solved satisfactorily by honest co-operative effort and some of them in their solution have opened new vistas of potential growth to this organization. As my tenure of office nears its termination, I congratulate you all on the achievements of the past, and bespeak your continued co-operation in maintaining those high standards of service which have won for The Canadian Press the commanding position it occupies in the national life of the Dominion."

ording to the financial resources available rather than an ambitious project which might fail of accomplishment. There should be the friendly co-operation and equal representation of all interested organizations. Assistance of the women of the community would also be invaluable. Important as well would be that practical men should have a hand in the building project.

At the commencement of his address, Mr. Fiddes gave an interesting account of how a wave of juvenile delinquency had been eradicated in Kamloops shortly after the war through an organization which he had directed. A committee consisting of business men, civic leaders, school authorities and police had been set up and a program of activities had been embarked upon. Through careful management, the youth of the city had been directed along proper lines and the delinquency had been eliminated in the community. Throughout, the principle had been followed that school studies must be of prior consideration to the recreational and sports activities. The students themselves had agreed upon the standard that must be maintained in studies before the sports could be indulged in. The whole program was conducted along a high standard of ethics and morals which had been rigidly adhered to.

As he had done in other addresses here, Mr. Fiddes stressed the importance of the personal leadership and direction over any material facilities that might be bestowed upon activities for the betterment of youth.

President W. M. Watts was in the chair and extended to Mr. Fiddes the thanks of the club for the splendid address. Guests, in addition to the speaker, were A. Bacon of Vancouver and Rev. Roy Durnford, Ken Harding and G. W. Johnstone of Prince Rupert.
