PORT DAY

Editor, Daily News:

In view of the fact that the Port Day Committee has stated on a number of occasions that Port Day would be held annually, we believe an explanation is due to the public for not holding the event this year. This action is necessary for the reason that the Prince Rupert Trades and Labor Council and the Deep Sea Fishermen's Union do not now see their way clear to participate in the celebration. Since their co-operation would be essential to making Port Day a success the committee is compelled not to hold it this year.

As was reported in your columns recently the Junior Chamber of Commerce is now planning a regatta on July 20 for pleasure and sport craft which, it hopes, will be in its way as successful as last year's Port Day.

The committee does not however, regard Port Day as a dead issue and it hopes that some time in the future it may be again possible to put on a successful event with the co-operation of these organizations and any others interested.

The proceeds of the 1938 Port Day amounting to \$689.71 are being held in trust. Until next year at any rate, they will be held for the purpose solely of helping finance Prince Rupert's next Port Day.
