## Whifflets

From The Waterfront

Ultra-violet light, noted for its body-building propensities, finds a new use in improving the flavor of pickled fish. Experiments conducted at the Pacific Fisheries Experimental Station here show that an ultra-violet lamp installed at the bottom of a tin-lined cabinet had a particularly sterilizing effect on brines and pickles used in curing fish. The fish, inserted in a revolving basket just above the lamp, are improved by the washing action of the light-treated brine and by penetration of the ultra-violet rays.

## The Letter Box

ANTI-CAPITALIST

Editor, Daily News:  
An editorial terming The Federationist an "anti-British publication" and declaring that "if there were a dictator The Federationist would not be allowed to publish" appeared in a recent issue of the Prince Rupert Daily News. As the statements in the editorial may reflect to the disadvantage of the C.C.F. (B.C. Section), of which The Federationist is the official organ, we believe that you will extend to us the courtesy of space in which to reply to the criticism you have made.

The Federationist is not an "anti-British" publication. It is loyal to the working people of Great Britain, the vast majority of the population today exploited by a tiny minority (5%) that owns three quarters of all the property in the country and operates it for its own profit.

It is true that The Federationist is an "anti-capitalist" publication. As such it is opposed to capitalist governments, Britain's included, whose imperialistic policies have given rise to the dictatorships and to their aggression.

If, as you say, Canada is to become involved in a war "against the dictatorships," the resultant economic stress will lead to attempts to set up a Canadian dictatorship under which not only The Federationist but all progressive elements would suffer suppression and regimentation in order that the profit making privileges of Canadian capitalists might be safeguarded.

In Canada and all over the world today the decadence of the present economic system is accompanied by the centralization of power in the state. If that power is used in the interests of the minority that would benefit from the retention of the production for profit system then we shall have some form of fascism.

If, as in our sister dominion, New Zealand, a democratically elected government used its power to legislate in the interests of the people as a whole, then we shall move forward toward production for use and the co-operative commonwealth in which there can be "Peace on Earth, goodwill toward men."

## LITERARY WINNERS

Recipients of Governor-General's Honors for Poetry, Fiction and General Literature Named

MONTREAL, May 1: (CP)—Kenneth Leslie, Nova Scotia poet, Gwethalyn Graham, young Toronto novelist, and John Murray Gibbon, author of many outstanding books on a variety of subjects, are the recipients of the Governor-General's Literary Awards for 1938. It was announced Saturday by the Canadian Authors' Association. The general literature, published by Canadian writers.

Kenneth Leslie's "By Stubborn Stars," his latest collection of verse, was the unanimous choice of the judges in the poetry division.

Leslie, now a resident of Boston, was born in Pictou, in 1892. Youth spent in his native province induced in the future poet a love of the sea, and a profound respect for the traditions of his people. His is essentially the Celtic outlook. A poet by choice, he has drawn the fundamentals of his art from a melting pot of strangely varied experiences.

Leslie's earlier books, especially "Lowlands Low" and "Windward Rock" were favorably received by discriminating critics. "By Stubborn Stars" for which he receives the award, reveals the compass and versatility of a memorable sonnet sequence, satires and "conversation pieces" in many moods and varied metres, and lyrics of poignant quality. Leslie stands revealed as a poet, disciplined in the richest traditions of Acadian singers.

Award For Fiction

"Swiss Sonata," a brilliantly conceived story of life in a Swiss boarding school, is a first novel, the work of Gwethalyn Graham, a young Toronto writer for whom British and Canadian critics have predicted a distinguished career. She is 26.

Miss Graham's antecedents, and the auspicious circumstances of her home environments and education, have provided her with an admirable background for a literary career. Her father's hobby is painting; her mother finds relaxation in translating "Alice in Wonderland" into Greek. Miss Graham's early passion for literature and the theatre were allowed full scope for development. At the age of 11 she attended Saturday morning rehearsals with Maurice Colborne and Barry Jones, who at that time were playing stock in Toronto. At 14 she was a confirmed and liberal-minded theatre-goer, having seen Peggy Wood in "Candida," and the great Pavlova.

Miss Graham had a year of wandering with her mother, through the Eastern and Southern states, broken by a sojourn on an Arizona ranch, and returning through California and the Canadian Rockies. The following year found the young author at school in Switzerland.

She endured the discipline of the Pensionnat les Allieres for four months, then went to England. In the autumn of 1931, after trying the stiff competitive examinations, she entered Smith College, Northampton, Mass. There the odyssey of youth had its end. "Swiss Sonata" was begun when the author was 21, and finished

when she was 23. It was published in the spring of 1938, and achieved immediate recognition.

Mr. Gibbon's Work  
No Canadian writer has made a more significant contribution to interpretative literature than John Murray Gibbon, whose recently published study of the racial origins of the Canadian people, "Canadian Mosaic," received the general literature award. The book has been widely acclaimed by British and Canadian critics for its compelling human interest, sound scholarship, and as an important contribution to the solution of a vital national problem—the problem of Canadian unity.

Mr. Gibbon has travelled extensively, visiting Japan, Russia, Norway, Sweden, Denmark, and other countries. Since 1913 he has been resident in Montreal. Folk song and handicraft festivals sponsored several years ago at Winnipeg, Quebec, and other Canadian cities were Mr. Gibbon's idea. The organization of these festivals in itself may be regarded as an important contribution to the moulding of a Canadian mosaic.

A Scot by birth, a citizen of the world by experience, and a Canadian by long residence and preference, Mr. Gibbon's reputation as one of Canada's outstanding literary men is secure. He is an authority on folklore and music "Steel of Empire," a comprehensive and absorbing history of the Canadian Pacific Railway is one of his most recent publications. He was the founder, in 1921, of the Canadian Authors Association, and subsequently became its first national president. More recently he was partly instrumental in launching the new Canadian Poetry Magazine.

"Canadian Mosaic," a volume of over 450 pages, shows how each major racial group in Canada has made some contribution to the cultural pattern of a new northern nation. Mr. Gibbon does not believe in the "standardized" citizen holding that Canada has been immeasurably enriched by the wealth of tradition brought into the country by fellow-countrymen of diverse racial origins. Tolerance and understanding, based on sympathetic knowledge of New and Old Canadians, will solve the problem of national unity.

Arrangements for the annual Governor-General's Literary Awards competition are supervised by the Canadian Authors' Association, acting for Lord Tweedsmuir. The committee of judges comprised the following: poetry, Dr. Pelham Edgar, Sir Charles G. D. Roberts, and Dr. Duncan Campbell Scott; fiction, Leslie Gordon Barnard, National president of the C. A. A., Roderick S. Kennedy, and Dr. W. T. Allison; general literature, William Arthur Deacon, Prof. V. B. Rhodenizer and Dr. E. J. Pratt.


