Trying To Save Her Koala Bear

Australia Takes Measures To Protect Her Gum Tree Animals

SYDNEY, N.S.W., May 1: (CP)—Australia, land of archaic animal types, is seeking to preserve from extinction the vanishing koala bear.

The koala, chubby, philosophical-looking fluffy animal that feeds on gum tree leaves is losing his fight with the white man who imported the European fox and the dog that ran wild and became the dingo. Further, the cutting of timber has left him only one stronghold, Queensland where gum trees give him plenty of succulent leaves to eat.

The New South Wales government, alarmed at a census that indicated only 10,000 koalas were left, has taken control of the privately-owned Koala Park, near Sydney.

Australia once contained about 12,000,000 koalas. Most were slaughtered by enemies introduced by white men, the rest by men themselves for fur.

It is pointed out twelve species of Australian animals and birds have been exterminated through indiscriminate killing.

HITLER IS GOD-SENT

Pastor Suggests That Pagan Leaders Have Been Sent to World To Bring Christians to Senses

Speaking at morning services yesterday in First Presbyterian Church, Rev. H. G. Funston said he believed it probable that God had sent pagan leaders into the world today as a punishment to the people and to bring them to their Christian senses. People, the pastor exhorted, should pray for the salvation rather than the destruction of Hitler, Mussolini and the Japanese for whom most people undoubtedly felt a spirit of condemnation. Instead of hatred and haughtiness, Mr. Funston urged an attitude of Christian charity and love between not only individuals but also nations. There should be no feeling of superiority either through position, rank, class or race. It was such an attitude that was productive of discord and led to war.
