## DEAD LIE IN HEAPS IN CHILI

### Cold Weather Is Being Felt

Sub-Zero Temperatures General in Ontario—Victoria Has its Coolest Day

TORONTO, Jan. 27: (CP)—Sub-zero temperatures are general in Ontario as the most severe cold snap so far this winter continues. Some parts of the province are virtually cut off by snow drifts.

VICTORIA, Jan. 27: (CP)—Victoria had its coldest weather so far this winter when the thermometer dropped to 29° above zero.

## SUPPORTER OF MANION

Harry Stevens Informs Commons at Ottawa That he Will Not Again Desert Banks of Party

OTTAWA, Jan. 27: (CP)—During the debate in reply to the Speech from the Throne, Hon. H. H. Stevens assured the House of Commons that he would remain a loyal supporter of the new Conservative Leader of the Opposition, Hon. Dr. R. J. Manion.

Mr. Stevens declared that the whole Canadian tariff policy needed revision and contended that the new United States trade agreement will add to distress and discontent in Canada.

## Snow Removal In Montreal Not So Costly This Year

MONTRÉAL, Jan. 27: (CP)—Montreal authorities are not complaining at the cost of snow removal so far this winter which has amounted to only \$195,000 as compared with \$500,000 last winter.

## Lumber Output Of B. C. Lower

Decrease of Fifteen Per Cent Shown in 1938 as Compared with 1937

VICTORIA, Jan. 27: (CP)—Lumber production of British Columbia showed a fifteen per cent decrease in 1938. It amounted to some two and a half billion board feet during the year just ended as compared with three billion board feet in 1937.

The decline was partly due to heavy hold over stocks from the year previous, decreased shipments to the prairies and the United States also being a factor.

## Weather Forecast

## LOYALISTS HOLD OUT

Declare They Will Still Resist Insurgents in Spain—Franco's Forces Driving On

HENDAYE, Franco-Spanish Frontier, Jan. 27: (CP)—Despite the stinging defeat and serious disorganization consequent upon the fall of Barcelona to the insurgents, Spanish government ministers insist that they are still in a position to hold out against the rebels and that the loyalists strength has been underestimated.

General Francisco Franco's troops, cheered by wearied and starving inhabitants as they entered Barcelona yesterday, are not tarrying there but are pushing on northward in pursuit of the retreating loyalists with a view to clinching the conquest and bringing about an early end of the civil war.

Today the insurgents, pushing on from Barcelona, captured the village of Badalona, six miles northwest, in their offensive which is immediately designed to conquer all Catalonia.

As many Barcelona citizens celebrated the insurgent victory, hundreds of demonstrations marked the end of hunger, privation and bombings.

## CANADIANS COME HOME

Three Hundred Volunteers in Spanish Civil War Sail—Five Hundred Left in Graves

LONDON, Jan. 27: (CP)—Nearly 300 Canadian volunteers who fought in Spain in the loyalist cause sailed today for home. Efforts are still being made to round up two hundred other Canadians who became detached from the main body at the Franco-Spanish frontier.

The Spanish government has insisted on meeting the cost of evacuation of the Canadians, stating that this was the least they could do in showing their appreciation for their services. Five hundred Canadians were left behind in Spanish graves.

The party of Canadian volunteers, which landed at New Haven from France and embarked from Liverpool, numbered 272. A spokesman said: "We are leaving Spain as soldiers obeying orders, not because we wanted to."

Eight hundred international volunteers are estimated to have been killed in air raids north of Barcelona preceding the fall of the provisional capital.

## GOVT WINS IN NORWICH

Held Seat in England by Reducing Majority, Critic of Foreign and Agricultural Policy Losing Out

NORWICH, Eng., Jan. 27: (CP)—Frank Medlicott retained East Norfolk seat for the government in a by-election by a reduced majority.

Norman Tillett unsuccessfully opposed the government's foreign and agricultural policy.

## New Airport At Calgary Will Be Ready Next Week

OTTAWA, Jan. 27: (CP)—Commander C. P. Edwards, chief of air services of the Department of Transport, announces that the new Calgary airport will be ready for use by February 1.

## United States Is Supplying French Planes

WASHINGTON, D.C. Jan. 27: (CP)—President Franklin D. Roosevelt announced today that United States aircraft manufacturers had agreed with the government's knowledge to supply France with an undesignated number of aircraft.

WASHINGTON, D.C. Jan. 27: (CP)—Grant McNeill, Co-Operative Commonwealth Federation member for Vancouver North, speaking in the Throne Speech debate in the House of Commons yesterday, expressed dissatisfaction with the report of Mr. Justice H. H. Davis on the Bren gun inquiry and demanded a Parliamentary investigation.

Mr. McNeill launched a bitter attack upon the Department of National Defence and its minister, Hon. Ian Mackenzie, and declared that the Toronto contract had been a "rank and bare-faced political patronage deal."

The North Vancouver member demanded a reorganization of the Department of National Defence in the interests of efficiency. He also urged complete nationalization of the arms manufacturing industry.

LONDON, Jan. 27: (CP)—Snow and floods have paralyzed transportation and communications in parts of England and Wales. In Ipswich many homes have been abandoned. There is flood water to a depth of five feet there.

DOCTOR UP FISHERIES  
Washington Legislature Asked To Approve More Intensive Methods Of Salmon Fishing

OLYMPIA, Jan. 27: (CP)—The Washington State Legislature has been asked to approve three bills designed to doctor the fishing industry by permitting purse seining, attempting to equalize the sockeye pack between Washington and British Columbia and permitting the return of all fixed gear to the Columbia River.

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## Local Subsidies Being Continued

Payments for Queen Charlotte Islands Mails and Prince Rupert Dry Dock Included in Ottawa Estimates

OTTAWA, Jan. 27: (CP)—The subsidy for steamship service between Prince Rupert and the Queen Charlotte Islands remains unchanged at \$12,000 in the estimates which have been tabled in the House of Commons.

Regular provision for maintenance of Prince Rupert dry dock is included in the public works estimates.
