EASTER AT KITSEGUOKLA

Special Services Held in Churches Of Indian Village

KITSEGUOKLA, April 14.—Special Easter services were held in the churches here.

On the morning of Good Friday in the United Church, with Capt. Johnson of the Salvation Army conducting the service, a special feature was a junior choir, robed in white surplices, which sang two songs to the memory of little Kenneth Wesley who died just a year ago.

Mr. and Mrs. Matthias Wesley trained the children who did splendidly. Alfred McDames led in prayer and Rev. Bishop Black gave an interesting and helpful address on the last words of Jesus, "It is Finished."

In the afternoon in the Salvation Army Hall Chief James Weget conducted a united service. An address on the words of Pilate "What I Have Written I Have Written" was given by Alfred McDames. Others taking part in the service were Peter Mark, Capt. Johnson and Rev. B. Black. Special hymns were sung. Large congregations attended all these services.

On Sunday-morning an early sunrise service was held in the United Church at 6:30 a.m. Following this at 11 a.m. the usual morning service was conducted by the pastor, Rev. Bishop Black. Easter hymns were sung and a message delivered by the minister. During the service Ben Woods' infant child received baptism and Mr. and Mrs. Woods as well as Pansy Pearl received the congratulations of many friends.

At 3:30 p.m. Captain Johnson and the Salvationists put on a delightful Easter song service entitled "From Calvary to the Resurrection." The order of service consisted of Passion hymns sung to action and scripture readings. Opening the service was a speech by Chief James Weget. This was followed by a song "Tell Me the Old Old Story." Miss Fanny Brown, clothed in a black gown, was surrounded by children, two of whom were kneeling, while the choir sang softly the song. Prayer was offered by Rev. Bishop Black. Then followed an action song based on the hymn "All Hail the Christ." Little children strewed flowers as symbols of His crowning. There was Scrip-

ture reading of Jesus in the Garden by Henry Wilson in English. The choir sang "Down in the Garden." Then Peter Mark read the story of the trial of Jesus in the native tongue. Following this, Lazarus Russell sang the "Pilate Song" and Captain Johnson read the story of the Crucifixion. The service closed with a short pageant displaying the Resurrection. A silver-colored Oriental tomb was placed on the platform. Louise Weget, a little school girl, was beautifully dressed in white with suitable colors to represent the angel. Dressed in white gowns two young ladies, Miss Clara Johnson and Miss Evelyn Weget, approached the tomb. As they stood silently gazing at the opened doorway the little girl, in a soft but clear voice, uttered the words, "He is Not Here, He is Risen." With bowed heads the young women slowly departed from the grave.
