School Observes Remembrance Day

Special Program at King Edward School Led By Miss E. A. Mercer

An appropriate observance of Remembrance Day took place at King Edward School on Friday with the principal, Miss E. A. Mercer, in charge. There were two parts to the observance. In the first part the children sang the choruses "In Flanders Fields," "Tread Softly" and "O God Our Help in Ages Past" in addition to the opening and closing numbers "O Canada" and "God Save the King." Miss Mercer spoke on the significance of the poppy and poppy day, what we might be thinking about during the silence and also the Canadian War Memorial.

The second part took the form of an illustrated talk on the Peace Tower at Parliament Buildings. The plan of the tower and, more especially, the outstanding quality of the conception and workmanship were considered. The wealth of detail in the memorial chamber with the remarkable reproduction of badges of the various military units that took part in the war and even the memorial to the horses, mice, birds and other beasts whose lives were sacrificed for the success of the war were all of interest. This program had a very special appeal to the children to whom in the past the Peace Tower must have been a rather uninteresting and impersonal part of the Parliament Building but, in light of the present war, took on a special significance.
