EDITORIALS

HITLER'S VENGEANCE

Hitler is swearing vengeance on the Polish Jews because they defend their homes against a ruthless enemy. It is to be hoped that Goliath will have no opportunity for such vengeance but that the report of the Poles that the Germans are on the run is correct. David did not talk big but he got results.

JUST BEGINNING

We are fighting against a clever enemy. We cannot expect that we shall win for some time to come. The Germans must be made to feel the pinch of war and hunger before they can be expected to admit defeat. For that reason we can expect setbacks occasionally. We cannot expect the allied nations to have it all their own way. There will be much suffering and we ourselves may also feel the pinch before the end. The war is just beginning. Our excess taxes have just begun. However, it is best to take the cheerful view but not be disappointed if there are reverses.

Yesterday the British Prime Minister said that the British troops had not yet taken part in the fight on the western front. Some of them were in France but they had not commenced to fight. Today they are in the conflict and they will get plenty before the Siegfried line is successfully crossed.

We believe in the British and in ultimate victory. Their presence on the western front makes us feel confident that the just cause will prevail.

COMMAND OF THE SEAS

Britain has command of the seas and that gives them a great advantage in this war. If Germany had been able to sweep British shipping from the seas, think what that would have meant. Britain would have been cut off from food supplies and would have been unable to send reinforcements to France. As it is, the Navy is winning the war for the allied forces.

YANKS FALL TO FELLER

Cleveland Harrier Wins His Twenty-First Victory of Season by Downing American League Leaders

NEW YORK, Sept. 14. (CP)—Bob Feller pitched his twenty-first victory of the season for the Cleveland Indians yesterday by defeating New York Yankees nine to four. The Boston Red Sox scored a one-run shut out victory over the Detroit Tigers, leaving the Yankee margin of leadership at fifteen and a half games.

In the National League, Cincinnati Reds blanked the Brooklyn Dodgers three to one and won a three and a half game margin over St. Louis Cardinals who were taking a close 10 to 9 hand hitting decision from the Phillies.

NEWS OF THE MINES

Big Program Planned for Surf Inlet—New Mining Property on Naas River—Silbak-Premier Still Pays Dividends

A larger development program is now planned for the Surf Inlet Consolidated Gold property on Princess Royal Island. Eastern directors, headed by Robert L. Reed of New York, recently visited the property with which they were well pleased, expressing the view that the increased program was fully justified. Mr. Reed said

that the directors considered the Surf Inlet and Pugsley mines, which have been consolidated, as having the makings of a big mine. Option payments have been taken up on the properties well in advance of the due dates and funds are available in addition to the earnings of the operation, for steady underground development. An important phase of the new program, already under way, is the reopening of the old Surf Inlet mine and the placing of it in condition to supply all mill feed, thus permitting work on the Pugsley tenth and eleventh levels to continue entirely as a development project without being impeded by the necessity of having to take out ore from the mill at the same time. The old 550-foot level

of the Surf Inlet mine has been put in condition and a cable hoist installed to give access to upper levels. A good deal of ore is in sight in these old workings and development is expected within the next few months to make it possible to maintain a steady supply of mill feed from this area. The Belmont Surf Inlet Mines Ltd. from 1914 to 1926 was credited with a production of some \$8,000,000. Further enlargement of the working staff has been prepared for. At present about one hundred men are employed and additional accommodation is being prepared prior to engaging more men for the underground program.
