but was constrained to admit that he knew less about it at the end than when he started. It was essential, the inspector felt, that the baffling community system be broken up. The fanatical devotion to leadership also presented difficulties. They were a rapidly breeding people. The seriousness of the problem could be estimated when it was considered that \$3,750,000 damage had been done by Doukhobor burnings and, although the government had spent thousands of dollars trying to solve the trouble

and prevent further, only three arrests had been made.

Members of the Junior Chamber expressed their appreciation of Inspector Barber's address by their applause and thanks were tendered by the president on behalf of the gathering.

Board of License Commissioners; Councillor of the Canadian Branch of the British Red Cross Society; member of the International Commission on Bovine Tuberculosis; Governor of the University of Toronto; Chairman of the Royal Commission appointed in 1906 to recommend a plan to reorganize the University of Toronto; Chairman of the Board of Trustees of the Toronto General Hospital; Director of the Working Boys' Home, Toronto, and Honorary President of the Peterboro Old Boys' Association.

Strong Prohibitionist

A strong prohibitionist, Sir Joseph Flavelle was Vice-President of the Dominion Alliance in 1900. He gave generously to a number of public institutions. He endowed a chair in Hebrew in Victoria University, (Methodist) with a subscription of \$25,000 and he and his wife in 1889 gave \$25,000 to the Victoria University fund. He founded a travelling fellowship in classics, \$750 a year, in the University of Toronto, and subscribed handsomely towards the erection of new residences for students of the University of Toronto.

Sir Joseph was a prominent member of the Methodist Church and was a member of the Board of Missions of that denomination. In politics he was an Independent Conservative. He was married to Clara Ellsworth in 1882, one son and two daughters being born to him.

Earlier Ships

A romantic episode befell the second "Southampton," built in 1757. Late in July, 1780, a convoy of cargo-laden ships left England for the East and West Indies under the care of Capt. John Moutray in H.M.S. Ramilles. With him went the Southampton and Thetis.

On August 8, strange sails were sighted on the rim of the horizon. Moutray signalled the convoy to alter course and follow him close to the wind. The cargo ships paid no attention to his orders and by daylight found themselves surrounded by the combined fleets of France and Spain, then at war with Britain.

Eight of the convoy, along with the three warships were all that escaped. The remaining 55 merchantmen, 2865 prisoners and avertised for best results

*Baked Fish Cakes

2 Cupfuls of flaked fish (cooked or canned)
2 Cupfuls of bread crumbs
½ Teaspoonful of salt
¼ Teaspoonful of pepper
½ Green pepper, chopped
1 Tablespoonful of lemon juice
2 Eggs
¼ Cupful of milk

Combine the flaked fish, the bread crumbs, seasonings, green pepper and lemon juice. Beat the eggs, combine with the milk and mix with the fish. Press into greased custard cups and bake in a moderate oven (350 deg. Fahr.) for about ½ hour. 6 to 8 servings. Serve unmoulded with egg sauce to which onion has been added. Garnish with parsley or watercress.


