Pending arrival of Mr. Jones' sister who is on her way from England to Vancouver, funeral arrangements have not yet been completed.

DR. KERGIN IS LEAVING

Dr. W. T. Kergin, outstanding pioneer physician and surgeon of Prince Rupert district, before leaving this afternoon aboard his power cruiser Full Moon for Vancouver, authorized announcement of his impending retirement from practice here and his departure for the south to reside. Dr. Kergin expects to be back from the present trip in about two weeks and in September will be leaving with his wife and mother to take up permanent residence in the south. They expect to winter in California and the exact point of future residence is not yet decided although it will probably be Victoria or Vancouver.

Their departure will be generally regretted for they have long been prominent and highly esteemed citizens. The doctor, who came to Port Simpson in 1905 and moved into Prince Rupert three years later, besides attaining eminence in his profession, has found time to serve the public in various capacities including the office of Member of the Legislative Assembly in the early days and for years chairman of the board of school trustees. He has also headed such organizations as the Masonic Lodge and the Rotary Club.

While residence will be removed from Prince Rupert, the doctor and his wife and mother expect to be able to revisit Prince Rupert frequently. Necessity of a lengthy and complete rest from professional duties has been largely the motivating factor for the move.

Accompanying Dr. Kergin on the trip down the coast to Vancouver with the Full Moon will be Mr. and Mrs. F. E. Robertson of Vancouver and Mr. and Mrs. C. W. Dawson and daughter, Pat, of Penticton, who have been here for the past ten days, having returned at the week-end from a cruise to Warke Canal waters. Dr. Kergin will leave the Full Moon permanently at Vancouver.

No definite announcement has yet been made but it is understood Dr. William S. Kergin, son of Dr. W. T. Kergin, will be moving to Prince Rupert from Premier in about a year's time.

Paris Aflutter With Seasonal Oversea Influx

Even Temporary Citizen is Old-Timer in Piloting Visitors Around Traditional Highspots

PARIS, August 1: (CP)—A tour of the shopping areas proves the indefatigable enthusiasm of tourists. They've invaded Paris in thundering droves, coming up from Cherbourg, LeHavre and Dieppe by dozens of extra boat trains. All are equipped with cameras and curiosity, bound for the first open-air terrace to parry an unquenchable thirst. The Parisians have left them the field—glad to be out of it—and it would be tactless and impolite to address any cafe waiter within five blocks of the Opera in any language but English.

A blister on both heels, three pairs of silk socks wrecked and a sore throat is this correspondent's sacrifice on the altar of good relations after a week of guide service. One now knows the necessity of being able to answer stock questions at once. Typical ones are: "Where can you get good gloves cheap?" "I've heard that you can buy the best perfumes for a song?" "I'd like to pick up a smart evening gown—something inexpensive—but Frenchy—something that will be a knockout at home!"

The most surprising Canadian citizens ask "Do you know an interesting little 'hot spot' where a fellow can get an eye-full of local color?" While others say sentimentally "Boy there used to be a little place in the Rue de la Galette during the War—now I wonder...?"

Another Side

Complaints begin about the third morning "Say what's the idea—having to pay everytime you take a bath?" "The only way I can get them to give me any butter is to order shrimps or radishes." "Funny system putting red lights outside cafes to indicate you can buy stamps—don't they have post-offices?"

Chief enthusiasms: "The taxi driver didn't go far enough down our street last night so I said 'advance' and he understood!" "Gosh champagne's cheap!"

Tourists crowd through Notre Dame and about Napoleon's tomb. Less known but more beautiful is the Sainte Chapelle with its slender flamboyant arches holding walls of sheer 13th century stained glass, unequalled anywhere in the world, except on the Cathedral of Chartres, for beauty of workmanship and richness of color.

But in the corners they stumble against piles of boxes lost in the shadows. The guide points out that the northern rose window is not up—but is packed away in the boxes where it was placed during the September "alert." "It's not safe to put it back yet," is the comment.

Tower and Books

At the Eiffel Tower the elevators are doing a roaring business carrying visitors up its 1000 feet to the platform which was for many years man's highest construction. The tourists are not surprised for they are familiar with its appearance and know what to expect. What they do not expect is to find the "water mirror," which reflected in color the pattern of the tower, replaced by cement trenches and dredging machines busily constructing others.

The bookstalls of the Seine always draw strangers. They invariably expect to find a Bible printed on parchment in the year 400—or an original copy of D. H. Lawrence's "Lady Chatterly's Lover" selling for a few francs. But, they usually go away satisfied with a yellowed copy of William Hazlitt's essays or an early edition of Victor Hugo or Voltaire.
