

His association with Canadian troops began when he was assigned to assist in schooling the 4th Canadian division in England. He went with the division to France in 1917 as chief of staff to Major-General Sir David Watson of Que-

Sir Edmund won the admiration of the troops by his courage and friendliness. He paid frequent visits to the forward lines always carrying a long scout pole and accompanied by a huge English bulldog. After a few months he was transferred .His next association with Canadians was in Siberia.

There Sir Edmund was commander of an allied force of American, French, Italian, White Russian, British Imperial and Canadian troops which fought the most northerly campaign of the war in 1918 and 1919 against the Red

The Canadian troops there included the 67th and 68th batteries of the 16th brigade, Canadian Field Artillery, under the command of Col. C. H. L. Sharman, who now heads the narcotic division in the department of pensions and national health.

Sir Edmund's informality, tact and command of languages enabled him to co-ordinate the work of all the various nationalities making up his forces under trying conditions.
