NOTICE TO SHIPOWNERS AND SHIPPING AGENTS

Entrance to the Port of Prince Rupert—Intimation to Ship Owners and Agents

Shipowners and Shipping Agents are advised that as a general rule, they should time the arrival of their vessels at the port for daylight. Delays will be avoided by giving immediate notice to the Chief Examining Officer, Prince Rupert, of the expected dates of arrival of their vessels, with particulars of appearance and tonnage, etc. The particulars necessary should be given on Form XI, a supply of which can be obtained from the Chief Examining Officer, Prince Rupert, B.C. This will facilitate the recognition of vessels by the Examining Officers and allow speedy allocation of berths.

Early intimation of the proposed departure of vessels should likewise be given to the Collector of National Revenue (Customs Division).
