BRITISH COLUMBIA DEPARTMENT of MINES

Five Million Dollars Worth Of Precious Metal in Prince Rupert Harbor

According to a statement made by Dr. Neal M. Carter, director of (52) the Pacific Fisheries Experimenta Station, in addressing the Rotary Club yesterday, there is about five million dollars worth of gold in the water of Prince Rupert Harbor but the difficulty is to get it. He outlined a number of methods already tried by different people, l of which had failed, but he suggested there was still a ray of hope that some plant or anima might yet be discovered which would concentrate the gold from the sea water in much the same way that kelps and seaweeds concentrate the iodine and potassium or that oysters concentrate

.C. Johnston who has been visiting of gold to the ton but the cost of collecting the fern would probably be too great to make it a profitable venture. Corn grown on some soil contained one-thirtieth of an once of gold per ton of living material. Coal ash has recently been reported to contained from one to five grains of gold to the ton. Petrified wood has been know to contain 18 ounces of gold and 11 ounces of silver per ton. Dr. Carter said that sea water contained about 3 percent salt Rod and Gun Annual Meeting and over ninety percent other' known chemicals. As long ago as 11869 a German by the name of Orange Bridge and Dance March Scheibler recognized gold in seal water and tried to recover some of it. Prior to that three French-Presbyterian Shamrock Tea men had discovered that there! was silver in sea water.

H. S. Blackmore, writing in Cas-St. Patrick's Supper, Catholicisier's Magazine in 1911, gave considerable impetus to fortune seekers by stating careful analyses indicated that a mile of sea water contained about \$93,000,000 of gold. 
