**PLANES TO
BE PUSHED**

Novel Means Devised To Circumvent United States Neutrality Laws

WASHINGTON, D.C., Nov. 23: (CP)—As American-made airplanes cannot be flown into Canada under the neutrality laws, arrangements will be made at various border points to push them over the border. Among "push over" points will be Sweet Grass, Montana, Houlton, Maine, and Valhalla, North Dakota. There will be extensive improvements to the airport facilities at these border points.

The others are Kay MacRitchie and Winnie Gallen, who played as snags with Grads during the fall. Betty Bowden, Flo Plante, Frances Gordon, Rena Fraser, Victoria Ewstuck, Dorothy Allan and Hilda Hughes.

Brothers Neil and Mac may be able to claim a bit of the credit if their kid sister makes the team. Last summer they bought her a ball and in the backyard of their home they built a hoop standard so she could get lots of shooting practice.

Backyard hoops are not new to Grad players. Similar ones brought very good results to Noel MacDonald, former captain who retired this fall, and Joan Williamson, veteran who is expected to succeed Noel as centre.
