INDIAN IS ACQUITTED

Etwell Dan of Babine Found Not Guilty on Statutory Offence Charges at Assizes

After deliberating for something over half an hour, the jury in the case of Etwell Dan, charged on two statutory offence counts, returned a verdict of not guilty at the Supreme Court Assizes here at noon today. The prisoner was immediately discharged. The jury added to its verdict a recommendation that, in the interests of justice in such cases as this, defence counsel be provided for accused. Mr. Justice Denis Murphy, the presiding judge, said that he welcomed the recommendation which he ordered transmitted to the Department of the Attorney General and the Department of Indian Affairs.

Hearing of the Dan case commenced yesterday afternoon and continued until shortly before noon today when the jury retired to consider its verdict. Witnesses were Dr. G. F. Ferguson, Constable C. F. Oland, Matilda Dan, Mary Joseph, Joshua Joseph and Louise James for the crown and accused himself, Dan Seymour and Pius Charlie for the defence. The stories of the star woman witness for the crown and the accused were contradictory. Accused denied the assault charge and claimed that it was the woman herself who was the aggressor.

The incident leading up to the prosecution took place at Old Fort Babine early this spring.

W. O. Fulton prosecuted, there being no counsel for the defendant.

The jury hearing the case consisted of James S. Black, foreman, Victor Menzies, Robert Greenfield, J. C. Gilker, Henry Amidon, S. G. Ayres, Fred Castell, J. M. Fleming, James Mulholland, George S. Thorne, Duncan Ferguson and James R. Fair.

The hearing of this case concluded the criminal portion of the criminal portion of the present session of the court which proceeded this afternoon to deal with an appeal of John Saunders, by way of stated case, against a conviction and fine of \$300 for selling liquor.
