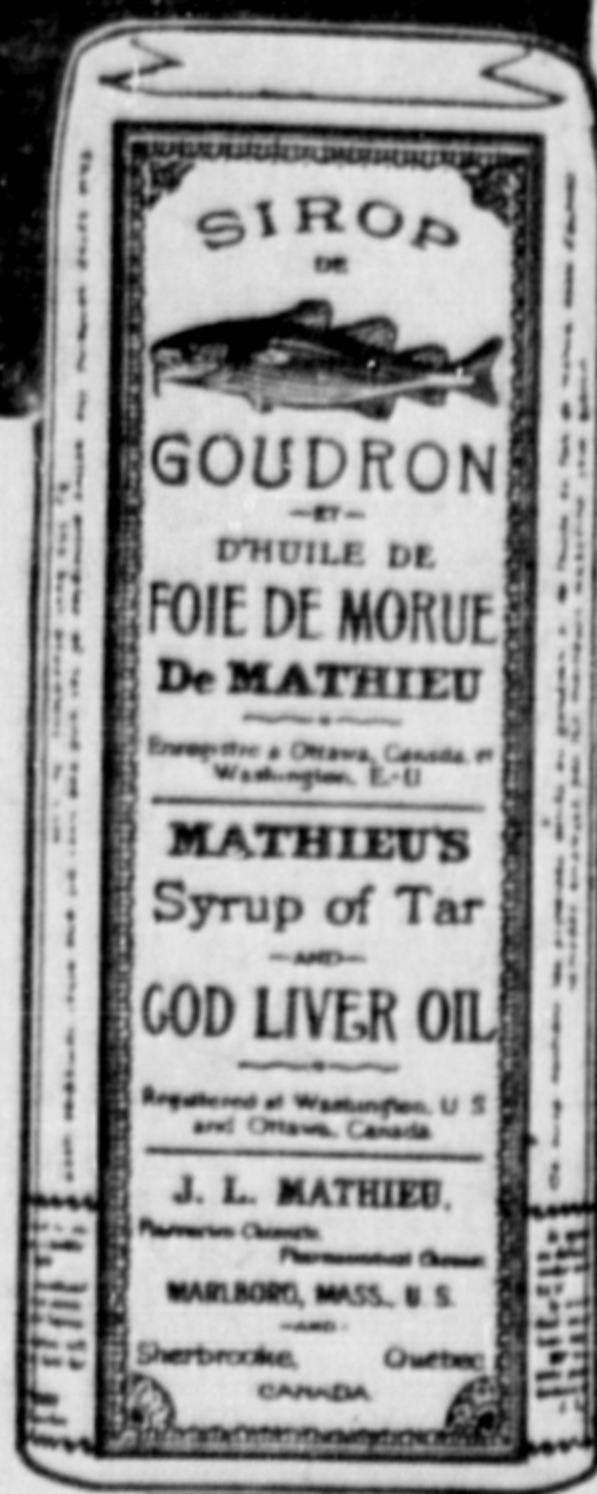

WIERD DREAM OF MISS TROY

Laird of Skibo to Be Made Duke for Promise That British Flag Shall Fly Over United States From Sea to Sea.

Not to know Lillian Scott Troy may be to argue ourselves unknown, but nevertheless we do not know the lady. Never heard of her before, declares the Vancouver World.

Her card, which lies before us, gives her habitat as the "Waldorf Hotel, London, England," and she further runs to a cable address. Accompanying the card is a four column article in which Miss Troy warms up the "Benedict Arnold Peace Society" on one side and then turns it over and warms it up on the other.

The purport of the whole is to show that the said peace society is not formed for the purpose of doing away with war among nations by means of arbitration, but with the one and sole object of securing a dukedom for Andrew Carnegie.

Proof? Any amount of it. The late King Edward visited Carnegie at Skibo castle and Miss Troy knows just what passed between them. Which of them told her, however, she does not state. Carnegie promised King Edward that the British flag should fly over the United States from the Atlantic to the Pacific.

King Edward promised Carnegie a dukedom—which was little enough considering.

So the peace society was got up by Carnegie to bring about arbitration and an entente cordiale between the United States and Britain, and expected war with Germany, of which Miss Troy represents the latter as being very much afraid, was thus to be headed off.

Exactly how the assimilation of the United States by the British Empire would be accomplished we are not informed, but a hint is given—when the British flag flies from the Rio Grande to the North Pole the Japanese flag will fly over the Philippines. The great event is dated for 1915, so that it will synchronize nicely with the opening of the Panama Canal, and enable us to celebrate both at once.

Of course it does not take all of Miss Troy's four columns to say just this. The rest consists of caustic criticism of English society and court circles and displays a knowledge of the subject which proves conclusively that the author must have been at the Waldorf Hotel, London, England, for at least six weeks.

DEATH OF DAVID G. STEWART; AN APPRECIATION OF HIM

IMPLE WORTH OF ONE OF THESE FLEETING TRIBUTES TO THE SKEENA VALLEY'S EARLIEST FRUIT FARMING PIONEERS BY ONE WHO KNEW HIM.

While February's blasts swept down the Skeena and Copper Rivers and giant old pines that had withstood the gales of scores of winters crashed down with a roar that rose above the gale, there passed away at Stewart's Landing on Sunday morning one of the bravest spirits that have blazed the trail for thousands to follow.

At the age of eighty-eight, in his old log cabin on the banks of the turbulent northern river, David G. Stewart, one time officer of the Ancient Company of Gentlemen Adventurers into Hudson's Bay, and for the last twenty years rancher on the Skeena, died on Sunday morning of heart failure.

The funeral services were conducted by the Rev. Mr. Dean and were largely attended by the settlers on both banks of the river for many miles. Hard by the grave of his wife, who has slept for many years among the sighing pines, the remains of the sturdy pioneer, who had reached the end of the Long Trail, were laid to rest.

Twenty-five years ago David Stewart quit the Hudson Bay Company's employ and started down the Skeena for the joys of civilization offered by the capital city and the railroad village of Vancouver. Seeing the possibilities of the valleys that then seemed so desolate and inhospitable, Mr. Stewart, with the pertinacity of his race, decided to settle and carve a niche in the wilderness for his own. Four years ago last spring, when his apple trees were white with blossom, he was approached by the agents of a transcontinental railway who opened negotiations for the purchase of right-of-way through his property. Although Mr. Stewart did not live to see the completion of the national transcontinental, his name will be ever remembered as the man who demonstrated the future of

growing fruit in the valleys of Northern British Columbia. Mayhap some day, when the valleys of the Skeena River are peopled by a prosperous population of farmers, some honor will be paid to the resting place of the man who, with single minded purpose and simple faith, made a garden spot among the tall pines of the north.

Single Tax in Washington.

Congressman Henry George Jr. has introduced a bill "to provide for a complete method for the annual assessment and taxation of real property in the District of Columbia." It provides for the gradual introduction of the land in the district will be assessed for taxation in the year 1913 at 11-15 of its true value and improvements at 9.15. Each year thereafter the assessment of land values will be increased and improvement values decreased until by the year 1917 improvements will be entirely exempt and land assessed at its full value. — American Economic League Bulletin.
