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UNITED STATES POLITICS

Visitors to the city from the United States Tuesday seemed unanimous that the spending policy of the President was all wrong and that the people had now discovered that it was leading them deeper into trouble while offering no solution of the employment problem. They seemed to think that, if Mr. Roosevelt offered himself for a third term, he would be defeated. While they realized that most people who benefited directly from the policy would support the Democratic party the opposition was now so widespread that a Democrat could not be elected next year unless there was some radical change of policy in the meantime.

EXPRESSED SURPRISE

One thing that interested and surprised visitors to Prince Rupert in the city this week was the appearance of beds of perennial plants they noticed in a number of gardens and particularly Theo Collart's on Fifth Avenue which looks its best just now. They said this was the sort of thing they had not seen anywhere in the gardens at home or enroute. Not only was it what they saw now but the promise of continuous flowering in the perennial beds in a good many gardens. They said it seemed easy enough to grow beds of annuals which flowered later but to be ready for spring and the early summer, such as what they saw here, was indeed surprising. There did not seem to be many gardeners among the Rotarians but those who seemed to know plants were keenly interested. They thought it was something for them to aim at when they returned home. They said it was common to see beds of tulips at home but they had not seen the perennials promising a succession of bloom.

AMAZING DENUNCIATION

Members of the C.C.F. political party were amazed recently when their party was denounced by a Vancouver religious leader who declared that the policies of the party were anti-religious and that they emanated from Moscow. Four columns of headlines were used to express the amazement of the party in this denunciation. The C.C.F. leaders have become so accustomed to denouncing everybody and everything that when they become the victim of denunciation they are amazed and say so in unmistakable language. If they remain in politics for a few years they will get accustomed to being denounced. It is only when political parties are in opposition and have never been in power that they can indulge in unrestricted denouncing such as has been experienced in the past few years. Once they have the responsibilities of office thrust on them they modify their tone and have to learn to take unmerited abuse without being worried thereat. They then are no longer amazed.

of becoming a burden to the people heavier than they should be asked to bear. While I regard much of this criticism as valid, I feel that, broadly speaking, the same criticism can be turned with equal force on modern business.

"It is not difficult to prove that the efficiency of individual business units should not be taken as a measure of the efficiency of business as a whole.

"If two skilled and efficient workmen are forced to spend 50 per cent of their time fighting each other merely for the opportunity to work, their actual production of goods and services will be but half their potential production. Half their effort will have been wasted and their standard of living will be but half what it might have been.

"In business today, we see skilled and efficient business firms (so far as their internal affairs are concerned) spending a large part of their time and effort fighting each other for the opportunity to provide their goods and services to the public. That means, in large measure, a wasteful and useless dissipation of energy which is partly responsible for the low living standards prevailing today.

"But even more to be deplored than the conspicuous waste of energy and materials is our refusal to use our vast assets in idle manpower and natural resources.

"If we are honest with ourselves, as we should be in these days, we are forced to admit that modern business leaders have not given us the answer to these questions and perhaps it is not out of the way to conclude that business management is not able to give an answer that will mean a more abundant life for you and I.

"Perhaps, however, we should hesitate to lay at the door of business a charge of failure to do a job it is not designed and is apparently unable to do.

"After all, business enterprise, as a vehicle for making available to the people the discoveries and inventions of pure and applied science, has some astonishing achievements to its credit.

"Within the past two hundred years our ways of living and carrying on our affairs have been radically altered by the Industrial Revolution which is still in full swing. While that two hundred years has brought with it many difficult problems, perhaps the most outstanding achievement of the era has been the increasingly rapid accumulation of physical wealth.

"If we review the twentieth century, we cannot help but be impressed with the rapid industrialization and accumulation of physical wealth in most countries of the world.

"Insofar as concerns the accumulation of wealth to supply the capital requirements of a rapidly expanding economy, and where the demand for capital remains unsatisfied, the modern system of private enterprise has proven itself to be well-adapted to fill those needs. "But where the effective demand

for capital declines in relation to the ability of the economy to supply it, and where the effective demand is definitely less than the available supply, we are bound to run into trouble.

Present Economy Inadequate

"I believe that the recent distress and instability of business, the relatively high percentage of unemployment, the generally low living standards and the apparent necessity for government to prop up the industrial structure, may be taken as an indication that our economy, as at present organized, is not adequate to present-day demands upon it.

"Let us look at the current situation more specifically and draw a picture, first of all, highlighting some of its contrasting elements.

"Looking for the moment at this continent alone, we see, on the one hand, a land rich in natural resources together with a people highly skilled in the industrial arts and the professions. That combination should enable us to produce an abundance of goods and services to assure the people of this continent a far higher standard of living than has yet been experienced.

"On the other hand, we have nearly a million unemployed in Canada and over eight million in the United States. We are using our resources only partially with the result that living standards are being kept at starvation levels.

"The concentration in the flow and control of the United States' wealth is indicated by the fact that \$5 billions out of a total savings of \$15 billions was laid aside by 24,000 out of the 27,000,000 families in the country. In other words, one-tenth of one per cent of the people saved half as much as the remaining 99 and nine-tenths per cent of the population.

"This state of affairs obtained at a time when a large portion of the people earned scarcely enough to

secure the necessities of life.

Co-operative Movement

Turning to the subject of the co-operative movement, Mr. Dolson explained that consumer and producer co-operatives are owned and operated for the benefit of consumers and primary producers. While these classifications sometimes overlap, they are broad enough to include the mass of the people. And in the very nature of their organization the net surplus of wealth made available by their operations is distributed to the mass of the people. That stands out in sharp contrast to the tendency of most classifications of business enterprise to concentrate wealth in the hands of the few and to impair the functioning of the economic machine to the extent that they succeed.

"There is comparatively little danger of co-operative enterprise being guilty of noticeable overreaching. What might have been overreaching by big business is distributed widely by co-operative organizations.

"Then, too, co-operatives usually co-operate. There is little reason for two organizations owned by consumers dissipating their energies in a useless duplication of effort, and you will find a constant tendency for co-operatives to co-ordinate their activities so that their benefits may be realized for their memberships. That again contrasts to the tendency of big business.

"Where big business co-ordinates its efforts to eliminate duplication or to exact a greater toll from the consumer or both the inevitable result is a further concentration of wealth with the unhappy results we have just noted.

"Be outsize waste and by encouraging a wide dispersion of wealth within the area of its influence, I believe that the co-operative movement sets up and maintains

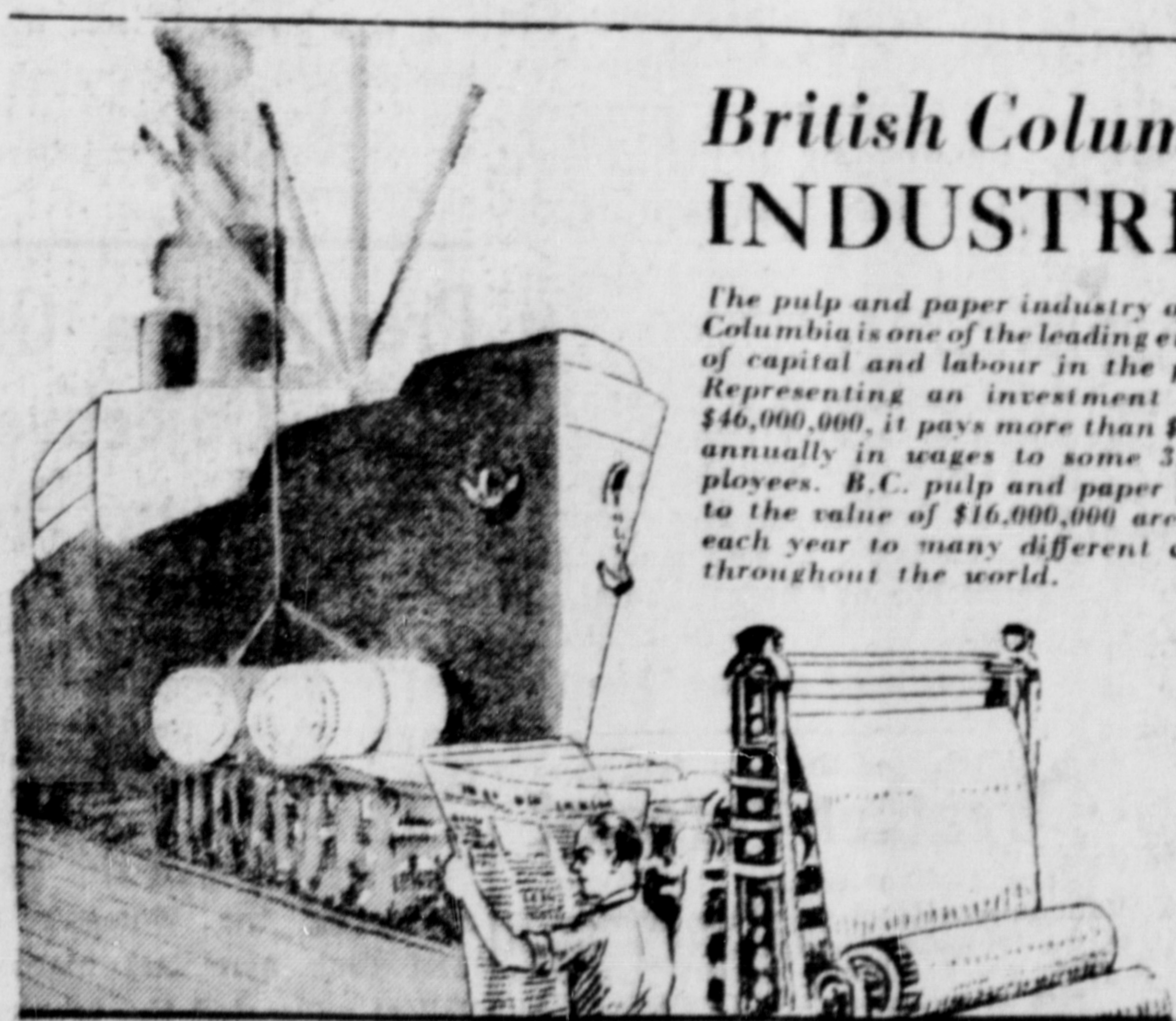
