## BALL RACE IS CLOSE

### Cincinnati Reds Retain Three-and-a-Half Game Margin Over St. Louis Cardinals

CINCINNATI, Sept. 19: (CP)—By splitting a double bill with the Boston Bees while the second place St. Louis Cardinals were doing likewise with the New York Giants, the Cincinnati Reds yesterday retained their three-and-a-half game margin of supremacy in the National League standing. The Reds won the first game from the Bees by a score of four to one but lost the nightcap five to four. The Cardinals dropped the first game to the Giants seven to two but swamped the New Yorkers 15 to 5 in the second.

In the American League, the New York Yankees, having already clinched the pennant, scored their one hundredth victory of the season with a 6 to 2 win over the St. Louis Browns whose one hundredth defeat it was.
