General Synopsis—The pressure high southwest of Vancouver Island but a disturbance approaching the Queen Charlotte Islands has caused rain on the northern coast. It remains fair and moderately warm in the Interior. West Coast of Vancouver Island—Moderate variable winds, fair shifting to southwest, freshening tonight. Prince Rupert and Queen Charlotte Islands—Fresh to strong winds with occasional showers.

CANBERRA, Australia, Oct. 13.—Prime Minister R. G. Menzies announced that Hon. R. G. Casey, minister of supply and development, will represent Australia at a conference of Empire cabinet ministers to be held in London to coordinate war resources. He will arrive in London before Christmas.

CRISIS IS EASED UP

Russia Accedes With Suggestion of United States to Ease up on Poland

HELSINGFORS, Oct. 13.—The Soviet-Finnish crisis became eased yesterday when it was learned that Russia had decided to soft pedal its demands upon Finland following representations by United States and the Scandinavian nations that nothing to be done to disturb peaceful relations between Russia and Finland. The nations united in the request to spare Finland from war and the loss of her national independence. In Finland the news was received with great jubilation although precautions against possible invasion continued. President Kallio issued a decree today ordering all Finnish civilians to hold themselves ready to aid the government in non-military pursuits if required in the present emergency.

Foreign Minister Erco of Finland, speaking last night, expressed praise and gratification over the action of the United States in interceding with Russia on behalf of Finland. An alliance between Russia and Finland was not feasible, said Erco, although political connections between the two countries were excellent and Finland had maintained its neutrality unshaken. Finland's only desire was for peace, Erco said, but, if attacked, she would defend herself. Erco said there had been no undue mobilization but all that had been done was merely precautionary. No demands had yet been made by Russia on Finland said Erco, the Mos-
