### RESPONSIBILITY

The outstanding man is often only the man who has had responsibility thrust upon him. There may have been a dozen of his neighbors equally capable who never had the opportunity to distinguish themselves. Sometimes a man is pushed forward by friends but the crucial test is that he rose to the occasion and handled the duties that came his way efficiently and in a manner to indicate his capabilities.

We have also seen men suddenly inheriting wealth or social position who failed to rise to the occasion. The wealth was dissipated, the position abused. If there went with it a position of prominence as head of a business or manufacturing firm, he fell down on the job and in a few years he disappeared. He is a weakling. Owning the machinery makes no difference to him. He is incapable of using it.

What we admire is the man who fits himself beforehand for better things and is ready at any time to take over more important work if it should offer. He is then ready to assume responsibility.

### SUGGESTION FOR ATHLETIC CENTRE

A suggestion has been made that, if it is found too difficult a job to raise money for the civic centre, advantage might be taken of the condition on Second Avenue to take over the old Westholme Theatre building from the city and convert it into a suitable centre.

The proposed building would not provide a large auditorium such as had been suggested would be a good thing for the city. It would not provide a swimming pool but it might provide a splendid gymnasium with dressing rooms and showers. The lot is 50 feet wide and 100 feet long and the building itself is said to be in fairly good condition. The advantage of using the old theatre would be that it could be made available almost immediately whereas it might be several years before a new and more pretentious building could be erected.

We are not advocating the suggested plan but simply drawing attention to it as a possibility in the solving of a problem that seems to have been baffling the local service clubs and others.

### ROME AND BERLIN

The governments at Rome and Berlin seem bent on following up their policy of aggression with the evident view of dominating Europe and with the co-operation of Japan possibly dominating the world. The picture is not a pleasant one but it presents a problem that must be solved. The situation must be met and met in a masterly and confident manner.

It is just possible there will be a demand throughout Britain soon for Anthony Eden to lead the British Empire in a firmer policy than that to which we have become accustomed. It is possible that Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain may realize the hopelessness of his policy of appeasement and be prepared to meet the dictators in the only way they seem to understand. The possibilities are so many and the situation so grave that it requires the most careful handling. The one outstanding need is preparedness and evidently Canada's Prime Minister, Mackenzie King, now understands that.



## FOOTBALL HEAD DIES

Charles E. Sutcliffe, President Of English League, Passes Away

LONDON, Jan. 13. (CP)—Charles E. Sutcliffe, president of the English Football League, died at his home in Lancashire at the age of seventy-three after a long illness. Sutcliffe, after long experience as player and referee, became a league official and for years was responsible for the compilation of the intricate league schedules. In 1919 he became vice-president of the League and in 1937 President.

## To Remain With Baseball Although Leg Amputated

CHICAGO, Jan. 13. (CP)—Monte Pearson, pitcher, who had his leg amputated last fall following an accident, remains on the roster of the Chicago White Sox and may even go to training camp this spring at Pasadena. He may attempt to pitch with his artificial leg. In any case, he will have a life time job with the club as an office assistant or a coach.

## Busher Jackson Is Not So Well

Famous Member of Toronto Forward Line May Be Suffering From Appendicitis

TORONTO, Jan. 13. (CP)—On his return here from Montreal where the Toronto Maple Leafs played with Canadiens last night, Busher Jackson, forward hockey will undergo a medical examination. It is thought he is suffering from appendicitis and may have to undergo an operation.

## DEATH OF BALL HEAD

Hopes Had Been For Days Given Up For Recovery of Baseball Magnate

NEW YORK, Jan. 13. (CP)—The death of Col. Jacob Ruppert, owner of the New York Yankees baseball club, occurred here today. Doctors had said that there was no hope for his recovery and expected that he would die at any time. Only his stout resistance had kept him alive this long. Col. Ruppert had been ill for a long time with phlebitis.

## SPORT CHAT

The Australian welterweight boxing champion, Hockey Bennet, broke a bone in his right hand in the second round of a 12-round bout in Sydney but won the contest on a foul in the last round.

A motion advocating two-piece swim suits for girls was defeated by a large majority at the Midland district conference of the Amateur Swimming Association in Coventry, England. Women delegates failed to support it.

England won all nine matches against Wales in an international badminton encounter in Llandudno recently.

Playing for Southern Australia state team against a southern districts cricket aggregation in an exhibition game at Adelaide, Don Bradman, Australian test cricket captain, made 131 in 63 minutes. His score included 16 and two sixes.

## KITKATLA HOOPSTERS PAY VISIT

Eight Games Played With Port Essington, Each Side Winning Four—Much Entertainment

PORT ESSINGTON, Jan. 13.—Kitkatla Senior and Intermediate basketball teams visited Port Essington over last week-end to conclude a series of eight basketball games which resulted in four victories and four defeats for either side.
