RESTLESS AGE

There has been some comment in the city at the large number of teachers leaving Prince Rupert this year and having to be replaced. Word received from Ketchikan is that ten teachers are leaving there just now and all have to be replaced.

Most teachers like to live in the larger cities where they consider the opportunities for advancement are greater. Also it must be remembered that this is a restless age and most people like a change occasionally.

NO ANNOUNCEMENT

No announcement in regard to the future was made by Prime Minister Mackenzie King at his anniversary party this week, much to the disappointment of many who were expecting some statement as to the probable date of the election and also possibly in regard to the leadership.

Evidently Mr. King feels that he has said enough about the election already, his intimation being that it might be some time before an appeal is made to the electorate. In regard to the leadership, the present is evidently not considered the right time to

be making a change. Perhaps by spring the international situation may have improved. At any rate it is up to the Prime Minister to say when he will advise the Governor General to call an election.

OUR YOUNG MEN

While it may be rather premature to discuss elections just now, it may be in order to point out that, when the next appeal is made to the country, many thousands of young men will cast their first votes. Some of these young men have received a university education but the most of them have only gone through the highschools or in some cases not even that far. They are our new citizens and have not heretofore, owing to their age, had an opportunity to express themselves through the ballot. The result of the election may to a considerable extent depend on how these young men vote. Some will vote the way their parents voted before them but many will strike out politically for themselves and will vote according to their own convictions. Older people will welcome them to the ranks of the rulers of Canada.

Timely Recipes

RED OR BLACK CURRANT JELL

5 cups (1 1/2 lbs.) juice
7 cups (3 lbs.) sugar
1/2 bottle fruit pectin.
With red currants crush about 4 pounds fully ripe fruit and add 1 cup of water. If black currants are used crush about 3 pounds fully ripe fruit and add 3 cups water.
To prepare juice, bring mixture to a boil, cover and simmer 10 minutes. Place fruit in dry cloth or bag and squeeze out juice.
Measure sugar and juice into

large saucepan and mix. Bring to a boil over hottest fire and at once add bottled fruit pectin, stirring constantly. Then bring to a full rolling boil and boil hard one-half minute. Remove from fire, stir, pour quickly. Paraffin hot jelly once. Makes about 11 eight-ounce glasses.
