Capt. Edgar Arnott's Cape Beale Again
Heaviest Halibut Lander at Prince
Rupert—Individual Records of
Canadian Fleet For Season
Now Ending

Capt. Edgar Arnott's Cape Beale again led the Prince Rupert halibut fleet this year for volume of landings, having brought in a total of 269,000 pounds in seven trips as compared with 315,000 pounds in eight trips last year and 316,000 pounds in eight trips in 1937. The Lois N., Capt. Ben Peterson, was the second heaviest lander this year for

The Takla maintained her position as heaviest lander per trip with an average of 39,333 pounds as compared with 40,286 pounds in 1938. The Cape Beale was a close second with 38,429 pounds as against 39,375 pounds while the Joan W. III, Capt. Al Woie was third with 36,300 pounds in comparison with 29,250 pounds in 1938.

The greatest number of trips made by a single unit of the Canadian fleet this year was twelve by the Gulvik, landing a total of 168,500 pounds. Boats landing eleven catches this year were as follows: Signal, 181,000 pounds; Tramp, 168,500 pounds; Rose Spit, 148,300 pounds; Viking, 145,500 pounds; Edward Lipsett, 129,500 pounds; Kaizen, 140,500 pounds.

Southbound from Skagway to Vancouver, C.P.R. steamer Princess Louise, Capt. S. K. Gray, was in port from 2:45 to 6 o'clock yesterday afternoon. The vessel had a large list of 224 passengers consisting to a large extent of White Pass and Yukon Route employees going south for the winter now that navigation is closed for the season on Yukon and Northern British Columbia rivers. Twenty-seven persons disembarked from the Princess Louise here, two going aboard the vessel at this port for the south.

Continuing on the local run between Vancouver and Prince Rupert via Ocean Falls and other intermediate points, C.P.R. steamer Princess Norah, Capt. Robert McGeachy, arrived in port at 3 o'clock yesterday afternoon from the south and sailed at 10 p.m. on her return to Vancouver. The Princess Norah is expected to make one more voyage in place of the Princess Adelaide which is undergoing repairs at Victoria to rudder and stern damage done in a recent contact with shore at Port McNeill, Vancouver Island.

Boats In Court
Stipendiary Magistrate Andrew Thompson has been busy in provincial police court this week hearing the prosecutions of local halibut boats under International Fisheries Commission regulations. Yesterday afternoon the case of the Oslo, Capt. Axel Olsen, was called and adjourned until next Tuesday at the request of defence counsel, T. W. Brown, who is seeking a change of magistrate. The Seattle halibut boat Kingfisher called here this morning with 27,000 pounds of fish, declined an offer of 10.6c and 7c on the local Fish Exchange and proceeded on to Seattle. Union steamer Cardena, Capt. John Boden, arrived in port at 12:30 midnight last night from the south and sailed at 4 a.m. on her return to Vancouver and waypoints.
