Mr. Johnson says that he is no authority on war preparations but it seemed to him that the English people are ready for anything.

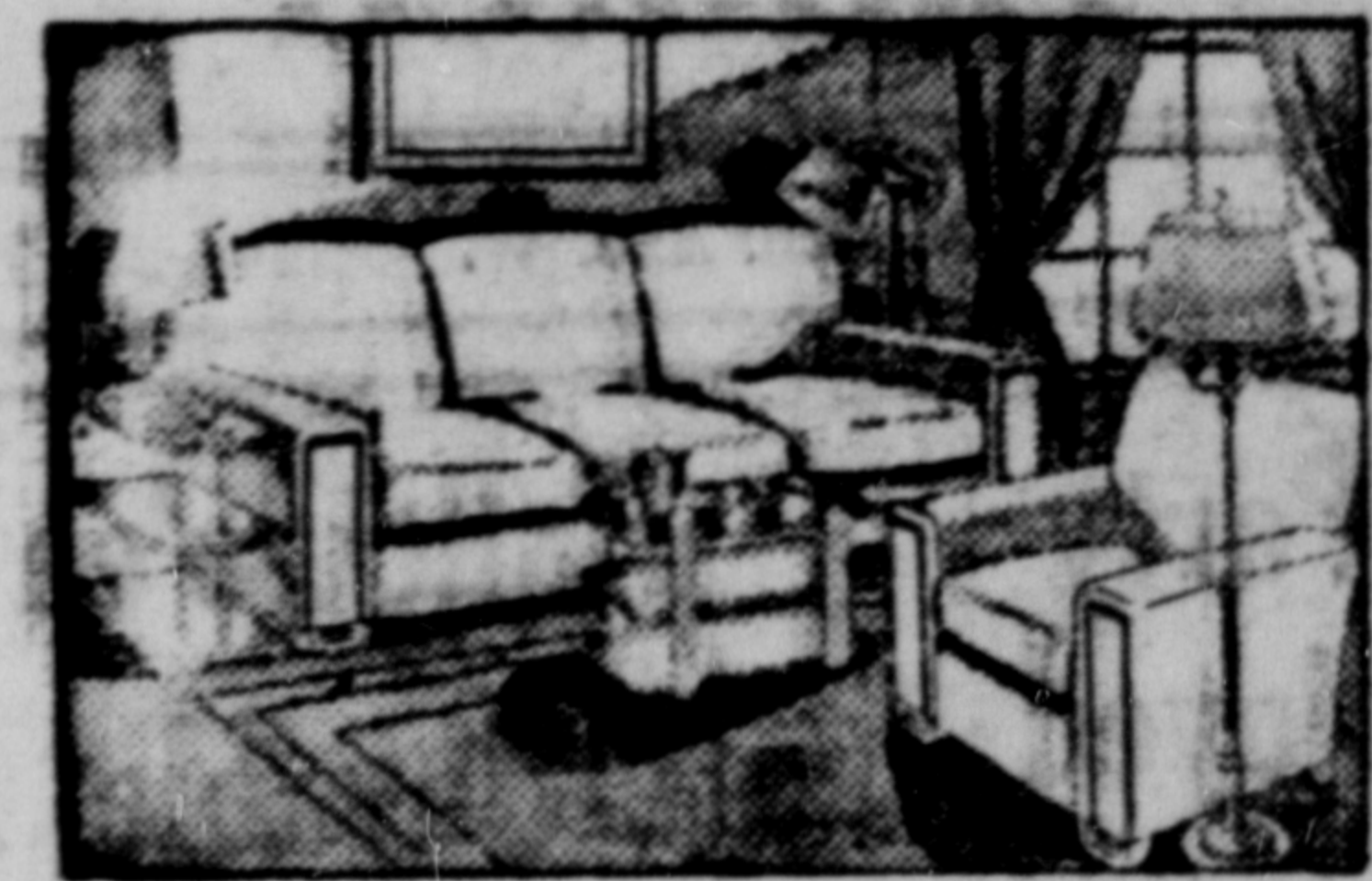
