AN UNJUSTIFIABLE ABUSE OF POWER.

The Victoria Times does not believe that in opposing and exposing the deals of the McBride government with corporations, and thereby involving the people of British Columbia in future obligations which will weigh heavily upon them, that it is writing itself down as an enemy of progress and prosperity. There is not the least doubt in our minds, nor in the mind of any person who considers the facts impartially and discriminately that the course of the plungers who are at present in power will in the not distant future involve serious consequences.

Take the conduct of the government in the manner of proclaiming dissolution and bringing on the election as an example of unbridled, unrestrained and unjustifiable abuse of power. Nominations are to be held on the 12th of March, in less than two weeks. There is not a candidate nominated in any constituency of the province. In some of the outlying constituencies news of the impending election will not be received for some time. Elections are usually supposed to be held for the purpose of obtaining an expression of public opinion. Elections are brought on by the McBride government for the purpose of circumventing public opinion. Usually, there is supposed to be a high public purpose behind governments and legislatures.

The McBride ideal has been tersely expressed by the Premier himself: "The thing is to get in, and after you are in to stay in." In pursuance of this lofty purpose we see what the legislature of British Columbia has been reduced to.

HOW FACTS GET TWISTED IN POLITICS.

One section of the Tory party in Canada decries the Liberal government for its bargain with the National Transcontinental Railway and the Finance Minister of the Borden government treats the terms as though they were a scandal. The ex-Finance Minister of British Columbia defends the deal of his government with the Canadian Northern Pacific and the Pacific Great Eastern by pointing to the Laurier bargain as a precedent. While Tory papers denounce the bargain made by Laurier, Hon. Mr. Bowser denounces Mr. Brewster for criticizing a far worse deal made by the McBride government. Good logic from a Tory point of view, but pitiable when analyzed by the public.

TROOPS CHARGE ON THE WOMEN

Militia and Police Attack Two Hundred Strike Sympathizers as They Are Walking Along Street—One Woman Arrested.

Lawrence, Mass., March 1.—Wives and mothers suffered again today in the Lawrence textile strike when Troop B of the State Militia, aided by a force of police, charged 250 women and a score of men who were quietly walking along Essex street. The charge came suddenly and without warning.
Although the small army of strikers broke and ran for shelter, offering not the slightest resistance, the cavalry pursued some of them as far as the common blocks away from the scene of the original charge. Several women were knocked down and trampled upon by policemen, who used their clubs freely on the men. One policeman knocked down a woman with a blackjack.

QUICK WEALTH A DANGER

Prof. Bland Warns Against Evils of Prosperity and Rapid Growth of West.

Prof. C. E. Bland of Alberta College, Strathcona, has addressed to young men a warning against the danger to the higher life threatened by the rapid growth and material prosperity of the west. The rapidity with which wealth came to many constituted a real danger. Fortunes made from real estate in a few years were likely only too quickly to sap the moral vigor of those who acquired riches without effort. Where money was gained so readily the love of money exercised a fatal influence to draw men's interests from the highest and the best. He knew, he said, of more than one instance of the theological students, entering this business for the purpose of earning money to pay college fees and attracted by the glamor of rapidly acquired wealth, forsaking the higher work of the Master to which he had been called.

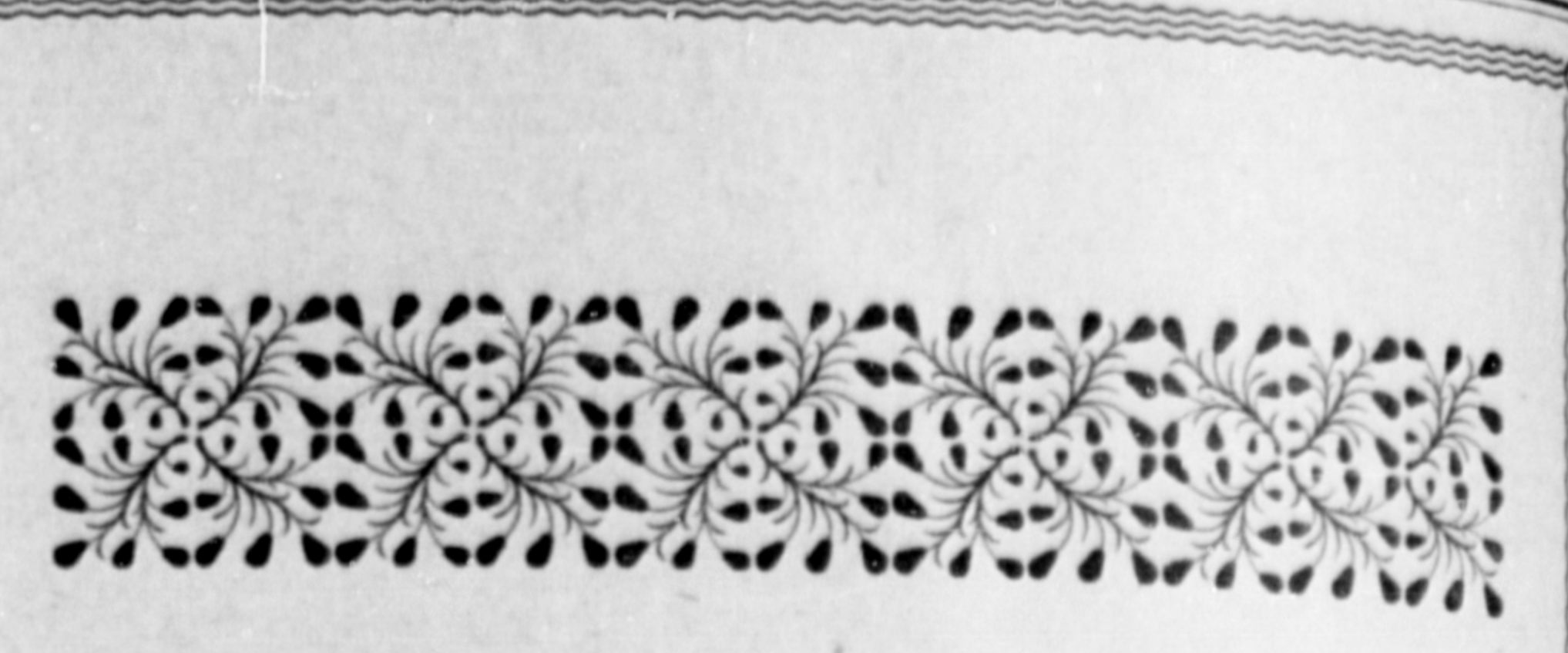
